Hilo, Hawaii

Welcome to the Big Island of Hawaii - a paradise of black-sand beaches, tropical rainforest and volcanic mountains. Mauna Loa, the largest mountain on the planet, soars above the bleak lava fields of Hawaii Volcanoes National Park. In the heart of the Big Island's lush rainforest lies the remote and stunning Wai'po Valley (Valley of the Kings). Hawaii's history matches its incomparable landscape - it is a saga of mighty Polynesian kings, sugar barons, war and treachery.

The landscape of the Big Island ranges from black-sand beaches to tropical rain forest to the alpine terrain of Mauna Loa and Mauna Kea. At 13,796 feet above sea level, the summit of Mauna Kea is the highest point in the entire Pacific basin.

Volcanoes National Park, Macadamia Nut Shop & Garden ITO-100 Approximately 8 hours / From \$149



Your journey begins as you board your air conditioned motorcoach and drive to Nani Mau Gardens. The gardens feature different species of flowers, fruits and plants, including orchids, palms, bromeliads, heliconias and rare and endangered plant species. Nani Mau Gardens is also home to a Japanese bell tower; one of only three in the world, crafted from 20,000 boards using no nails or screws. You'll receive a map of the garden trails for a self-guided tour at your leisure. Remember your camera, as the garden is a photographer's paradise!

You will have lunch at Nani Mau's garden view dining room where a delicious island-style buffet featuring a local, seasonal menu will be served. The next stop will be at the monument of King Kamehameha for a photo opportunity of this island's esteemed monarch. See otherworldly landscapes: twisted lava rock flows, sulfur banks and lava beds. According to Hawaiian legend, it is bad luck to take home pieces of lava rock (and many disbelievers have found this out, as rocks are mailed back to Hawaii each year). Then, we'll travel to the Thomas A. Jaggar Museum. Located near the Hawaiian Volcano Observatory, this museum offers panoramic views of Kilauea Caldera and Halema'uma'u Crater. The exhibits explain the history and geology of Hawaii's volcanoes.

At the Thurston Lava Tube, you'll go for a short walk through a prehistoric-looking tree-fern forest to a cave-like tube, a lava tube that was once filled with red-hot molten lava, many hundreds of years ago.

Continue on to Pana'ewa Rainforest Zoo & Gardens. The only tropical rainforest zoo in the United States, here you are invited to stroll the grounds that have over 100 varieties of Palm or stroll with Peacocks in the extensive collection of Orchids, Clumping Bamboos and Tropical Rhododendrons. The planting effort by volunteers is continuous and the Zoo grounds are considered a botanical

garden.

Summit of Mauna Kea**ITO-110 Approximately 6 hours / From \$169**

Your tour begins at the pier where you'll board an air-conditioned 4x4 van and drive through historic downtown Hilo, passing Rainbow Falls, the Mauna Loa lava flows and the Kipuka Pu'u Huluhulu Native Tree Sanctuary, en route to Mauna Kea on a new scenic highway.

Mauna Kea is a sacred place with an ancient history, cultural sites and unique beauty created by fire and ice. The ancient Hawaiians considered Mauna Kea home of Poli'ahu, the snow goddess, and used the mountain as a burial site of high chiefs.

Today, the mountain is the world's premier site for astronomy. Your first stop on the mountain is the Onizuka Center for International Astronomy where we will acclimate on the way up and have lunch on the way down. They also have a store with wide range of warm and cold beverages, snacks and souvenirs.

From the center, you'll re-board the van for the ride up to the summit at 13,796 feet above sea level and the Keck Observatory (open weekdays). Bring your camera for views unlike any other throughout the islands.

We'll head back to the Onizuka Visitor Center for a picnic-style lunch before returning to the pier where your ship awaits you.

Off the Beaten Path**Lava Tree State Park & Hilo's Volcanic Heritage****ITO-215 Approximately 5.5 hours / From \$99**

Your journey begins as you board your air-conditioned van or mini bus and head to Hilo's famous Rainbow Falls on the way to Lava Tree State Park in Puna on the eastern rift zone of Kilauea.

Behold a surreal landscape of standing tree molds created by hot magma. In 1960, the massive Kapoho lava flow engulfed the area with enough molten lava to pave an eight-lane highway four times around the world. The lava-tree molds were formed when lava surrounded the trees, cooling on contact and instantly incinerating them, leaving only the mold of the tree as lava drained away.

Next stop is Ahalanui warm springs, a geothermal lagoon that is fed by natural springs heated by the volcano to about 90 degrees. As you continue on the drive, you'll come upon some of the last untouched tropical coastline in Hawaii.

At Mackenzie State Park, you'll view the dramatic scenery formed when lava meets deep sea, cliffs, lava tubes and blowholes. Down the coast, you'll visit Kaimu, once the site of a famous black sand beach and a small town, both destroyed by a 1990 lava flow. Here, you will walk on the new land to a new black sand beach. You'll see Uncle Robert's Hawaiian Village and Kalapana Cafe, all survivors of the Lava Flows. We then visit Mauna Loa Macadamia Nut Farm before returning to the pier.

Upon arrival at the Hawaii Botanical Tropical Garden, you'll receive a map of the garden trails for a self-guided tour at your leisure. Discover more than 2,000 different species of flowers, fruits and plants, including orchids, palms, bromeliads, heliconias, as well as many rare and endangered plant species. Remember your camera, as the Orchid Garden is a photographer's paradise!

You'll have time to visit the Botanical Garden's gift shop, which offers a fine array of art glass, ceramics, jewelry and other items handcrafted by local artisans. Tropical flower bouquets can be shipped the day you order. (Check shipping destinations at the gift shop.)

The return trip includes a narrated tour of old Hilo town that passes the King Kamehameha statue.

You'll arrive at The Hawaii Tropical Botanical Garden for a leisurely self-guided walk with the help of an official map delineating all the major sights. This tropical rainforest, with its waterfall, meandering streams and rugged ocean coastline, is home to colorful "Sexy Pink" and "Lobster Claw" Heliconia, mysterious "Bat plants", Giant Anthuriums, exotic Gingers, and more than 2,500 species of tropical flowers, fruits and plants collected from many parts of the world.

The incomparable open-air Orchid Garden is one of the largest orchid displays in the world. The spiritual Palm Jungle, enchanted by a Cathedral of Alexandra Palm trees, a three-tier waterfall and the unmatched natural beauty of Onomea Falls are mesmerizing sights. A new, state-of-the-art Bird House is home to the Garden's eight colorful Macaws and the Lily Lake teems with koi and aquatic plants. And there are dazzling ocean views that entice you to sit and breathe in the serene atmosphere.

Then you will be transported to the hidden treasure of the 500-acre OK Farm. Nestled above the historic town of Hilo across from the famous Rainbow Falls overlook, the farm is the setting for a small-group exploration by 4WD mini bus. You'll see fields brimming with a wide variety of crops-tropical fruit, macadamia nuts, heart of palm and coffee. And you'll get to sample the fresh seasonal produce along the way.

Soak up the captivating views, cool breezes, and pure Hawaiian beauty and then, arriving at the farm's private Rainbow Falls Gazebo you'll have a hands-on experience in cracking and tastking raw macadamia nuts while you relax in the shade and enjoy a farm-inspired picnic lunch. Sip "Spice Alley Lemonade" created with OK Farm's striped lemons, Amalulu honey, lemongrass, lime Leaf, and special spices. Savor tangelo glazed chicken breast wrapped in a fresh tortilla with organic greens, hearts of palm and Kamuela tomatoes. (A vegetarian wrap is also offered). Accompaniments include Molokai sweet potato salad and a macadamia and chocolate chip cookie.

After lunch, you can set off on a short farm walk. You'll come face to face with a Hawaiian boar at the farm's feral pig exhibit. Held within the tropical landscape of the farm, your local Hawaiian guides will entice your imagination with stories and visuals of Hawaiian culture. It will surely be an adventure for your senses as you spend the day experiencing one of Hilo's most exclusive treasures!

Before your journey ends visit the delectable Big Island Trading Company where you will indulge in handmade Hawaiian treats and 100% Hawaiian coffee. Return to the ship with a camera filled with lovely pictures!

Special Notes

Participants should wear comfortable walking shoes and be capable of walking trails that total more than one mile in length. The entrance/exit boardwalk at the Hawaii Tropical Botanical Garden is a steep 500 feet and golf cart assistance is available for this portion only if needed. Sunscreen, insect repellent, camera and hat are recommended.

Activities & Adventures

Zipline Through Paradise

ITO-400 Approximately 4 hours / From \$199



Meet your guides, get a safety orientation and climb into your zip gear for the only all-dual-track zip course throughout Hawaii Island. Enjoy fast-changing ocean, river, gorge and waterfall views. You'll ride side-by-side along an 8-line course soaring from one sky-high platform to another. With your heart pumping you'll come to the end of the first line and the fully automatic self-regulating magnetic braking system will bring you to a safe and comfortable stop.

Catch your breath because there are 7 more runs, and each one is more spectacular than the last. Line 2 offers impressive views of Hilo Bay and Honolii River. Looking mauka (towards the mountain), you'll catch vistas of Mauna Loa and Mauna Kea, the two huge volcanoes that make up the bulk of the Big Island. Turn to the south and you'll be treated to views of smoke and steam rising from the Pu'u O'o vent of Kilauea Volcano.

Line 3 takes you along the river through a native Hawaiian rainforest and Line 4 reveals a double-tiered waterfall. At Hale Ho'onanea, or "house of peace", you'll enjoy light snacks, a beverage and access to the restrooms. Line 5 arrival and Line 6 departure share a platform, the tallest on the course! Start out over the tree-top canopy high above the river. Keep a sharp eye and you'll catch a glimpse of a beautiful hidden grotto complete with tropical waterfall. Then look to your right and view the river stretching out 200 feet below you.

Before you know it, you'll be racing your zip partner down an old logging road approaching the arrival platform before you hit the brakes. Walk down a few steps and across a short foot path to the departure platform of Line 7. Start zipping and the forest floor below you almost immediately falls away revealing the gorgeous river ravine 160 feet under your feet.

Several waterfalls reveal themselves as you pass a curve in the river affording amazing views both up- and downstream. Line 8 is the longest line of the course, close to 1/2 mile long! Reach it by traversing the fifth and final suspension element that connects Line 7 arrival to Line 8 departure. After a short zip across the peninsula, you drop right down into the river gorge. The sights and sounds envelope you as you take in the ride. You will travel directly down the middle of the river, soaring over several waterfalls and rapids.

This is an amazing adrenaline rush which rewards you with a surprisingly gentle landing at the arrival platform. A few steps and a short uphill walk will bring you back to meet your transport back to Hale Halawai.

Kilauea Volcano Bike Adventure

ITO-450 Approximately 6.5 hours / From \$139



Fill your senses with the adventure of a lifetime as you bike and learn about Kilauea Volcano, the world's most active volcano. Located along the southern shore of the island, the volcano, at 300,000 to 600,000 years old, is the second youngest product of the Hawaiian hotspot.

Begin your adventure with pick-up at the pier. You'll board a comfortable air-conditioned van and embark on a scenic drive. Circling the Waiakea Peninsula, Banyan Drive draws the eye with fifty banyan trees, popular resort destinations, and views of Reeds Bay and Hilo Bay. As the drive rounds west along the peninsula, you'll find yourself in beautiful Lili'uokalani Gardens. Named after Hawaii's last reigning monarch, Queen Lili'uokalani, this authentic, 30-acre Japanese garden was dedicated in 1917 as a tribute to Hawaii's first Japanese immigrants who worked in the Hawaii Island sugar cane fields. It features arching red bridges over fishponds, rock gardens, pagodas, Japanese stone lanterns and a teahouse. Views of Hilo Bay and Moku Ola (Coconut Island) enhance this peaceful setting.

Arriving at Hawaii's Volcano National Park for a briefing and bike orientation, you'll get equipped with a 21-speed mountain bike, helmet, gloves, rain jacket and souvenir water bottle. The easy, approximately 8-mile paved road around the rim of the crater follows mostly level terrain and provides some of the most eye-popping views in the Hawaiian Islands. The ride also includes some paved trails and off-the-beaten path places where vehicles are not allowed. You will have a bit of uphill and downhill sections thrown in for fun!

Then, after completing your bike ride, you'll stroll through a lush rainforest that leads directly through an amazing lava tube. Experience the heart of the Volcano at Halema'uma'u Crater. This is a rare and magnificent sight to be able to visit and witness an active volcano in your lifetime. Enjoy fresh fruit, macadamia nuts and other assorted snacks during the tour.

After your ride, stop at the Jaggar Museum where you will see videos of the volcano erupting. The Jaggar Museum is also home to many seismographs, which monitor every twitch of the earth. Throughout your half-day tour your guide will share the history and geology of the area and provide you with frequent photo stops. What an exciting and active way to embrace a natural wonder that was named a World Heritage Site by UNESCO in 1982!

Medical Restriction

Natural sulfur gases may affect those with respiratory problems.

Special Notes

Minimum age is 12 years. Minimum height is 54". Participants must be comfortable riding a bike but at any time during the trip may rack their bike and ride along in a van. Rainbow Falls, Wailuku River & Kaumana Caves

ITO-475 Approximately 3.5 hours / From \$99



Board your air-conditioned van and drive through Banyan Drive and Lili'uokalani Gardens then travel past hidden rivers, cascading waterfalls, and Honoli'i Surf Spot en route to Rainbow Falls.

Make your way to Rainbow Falls past giant banyan and mango trees. Marvel at the mighty Wailuku River as it plunges down into Rainbow Falls. Travel by van to Boiling Pots where the river rushes through old lava tubes creating a "boiling" effect.

Re-board the van and climb down an almost vertical staircase to explore Kaumana Caves. These natural wonders were formed by the 1881 eruption of Mauna Loa, the largest volcano in the world. Legend has it that the volcano ceased erupting only after a Hawaiian princess prayed to Pele the Goddess of Fire.

Leaving the depths of the earth, continue through historic Hilo to the rugged coastline and a black sand cove. This is a visual for the exploring eye as it is surrounded by unique lava formations and marine life.

Before your journey ends visit the delectable Big Island Trading Company where you will indulge in handmade Hawaiian treats and

100% Hawaiian coffee.

Here Kolekole Creek plummets 442 feet into a densely forested gorge.

Return to your tour vehicle for the return drive to Hilo, enjoying views of Onomea Bay. Your destination is Rainbow Falls, where the Wailuku River plunges 100 feet past a large lava cave into a turquoise pool. View the river through stands of orchid, bamboo and wild ginger as you return to your tour vehicle.

Special Notes

Bring sun protection and wear comfortable closed-toe walking shoes and clothes suited to the day's weather conditions.

Kilauea Lava Fields, Hawaiian BBQ & Lagoon Swim
ITO-505 Approximately 6 hours / From \$179



Drive across the black lava flows, to the Puna District and Kilauea Volcano. Hear first-hand stories of life in Kalapana from the former residents who witnessed the destruction. You'll walk across the lava flows, which entomb the former village of Kalapana, and find the new black-sand beach of Kaimu.

Next, enjoy a Hawaiian-style BBQ lunch. After lunch, travel across the stark black lava flows to find where the lava met the sea in an eruption that destroyed the town of Kapoho in 1960.

Your next destination is Lava Tree State Park for a short walk, where in 1790, a lava flow covered the jungle and Ohia trees. See a surreal landscape of standing tree molds created by hot magma. In 1960, the massive Kapoho lava flow engulfed the area and lava molds of the trees were formed, cooling on contact while incinerating them.

Finally your guide will share a beautiful black lava lagoon, protected by a reef. Swim or explore the fascinating coastline here before you return to your ship.

Kona, Kailua Village & Open-Ocean Dolphin Swim
ITO-725 Approximately 8 hours / From \$219



Board your air conditioned motorcoach and travel along Route 200 and 190 from Hilo to Kona, enjoying views of Mauna Kea and Mauna Loa. Along the way, experience the Big Island in its' entirety while your driver/tour guide provides insight into the volcanic history of the Big Island as well as the island's 11 microclimates (only 13 climate zones exist worldwide). Because the mountains block

the northeasterly trade winds, the Kona side of the island gets very little rain and enjoys more than 300 days of sunshine a year.

Continue to Kona where you will meet your captain and board your 24-foot, high-powered motorized Zodiac raft. Glide across the waves, while searching for pods of wild dolphins. Only these fast and maneuverable military Zodiacs can get you in up close to explore the rugged coastline. A naturalist or marine conservationist will be onboard to provide information on marine mammal behavior (Hawaiian Spinner dolphins and humpbacks during whale season).

Along the short trip to Kona Coast, you may encounter pods of Hawaiian Spinner dolphins in their natural habitat. Spinner dolphins are the smallest of dolphins found in Hawaii. They have the unique behavior of jumping up out of the water and spinning like a top. They can spin up to 7 revolutions at one time. If you choose to, you may suit up into your mask and fins, and gently slip over the side. Having been briefed on proper protocol, you gently float in the vicinity of the dolphin pod. You'll be mesmerized as these amazing mammals glide along beneath you, a once in a lifetime experience.

After swimming with wild dolphins, with time permitting, you may have an opportunity to snorkel along a coral reef. A light lunch will be served onboard the Zodiac, including deli sandwiches, juices, water and sodas.

Before returning to the pier, your captain/guide will show the historic Kailua Kona Village from an "ocean perspective." Once a small Hawaiian fishing village, Kailua Kona grew to become the political, social, and commercial center of Kona in the 19th century. When King Kamehameha I (known as "Kamehameha the Great") chose Kailua Kona to be his final home, Kailua Kona became the capital of Hawai'i for many years. It is from the beach of Kamakahonu ("Eye of the Turtle"), that King Kamehameha united the warring Hawaiian islands.

From your Zodiac, you will see the king's refurbished temple to the God Lono, the "Au'hena Heiau", which sits on sacred ground. Historic structures such as Hulihe'e Palace, an important summer residence for the royal family, the Moku'aikaua Church, the first and oldest Christian church in all of Hawaii, indicate Kailua's importance as the center for early missionary activity. The "Seawall" along village waterfront was made from stones recycled from gun-turreted forts that were constructed after the reign of Kamehameha the Great and the destruction of the Au'hena Heiau.

Before departing the Kailua Kona pier, you will have the opportunity to shop for some authentic Kona coffee, grown and sold by local coffee farmers. On your return to Hilo, you will drive upcountry, passing through Waimea town, paniolo country and the famous Parker Ranch, founded in 1847 and one of the oldest and largest ranches in the United States. Experiencing firsthand the route the paniolos took when herding the cattle to Kailua village. After passing through Waimea, your return drive will take you along the spectacular, scenic Hamakua Heritage Coast drive. This coastline is rich with 117 years of sugar plantation history. You will be passing through the small town of Honokaa, and then driving through gulches and small waterfalls until you return to Hilo town and the pier.

Your adventure begins from a black sand beach in the heart of Hilo, just a short distance from the cruise ship pier. Enjoy a great day on the water with fun guides and amazing views - look out for a glimpse of the Mauna Kea Summit. Hilo is situated in a portion of Hawaii's rainforest country, so be prepared for plenty of rainbows and a lush tropical coastline.

Your kayaking excursion will take you out across Hilo Bay shoreline with magnificent views of the Wailoa Park Estuary and the Wailuku River Waterfall, where the 18-mile river reaches the ocean. Paddle under the "Singing Bridge" and up Wailuku River, which takes you to a beautiful waterfall where you can cool off or just enjoy the mist from the waterfalls.

Your guided paddle in the calm and historic Wailoa Estuary offers great views and a good workout too! Paddle past the golden King Kamehameha statue and listen as your guide shares local history and lore. Keep an eye out for green sea turtles and the Nene, Hawaii's state bird. Stand up paddle surfing, or in the Hawaiian language Hoe he'e nalu, is an offshoot of surfing that enables participants to paddle in quiet bays and lakes, to glide long distances along sea coasts, and to join in international races. Upon completion of your paddle, you'll return to the pier. The drive spotlights the stunning scenery that makes the Big Island such a natural paradise.

Medical Restriction

Not recommended for those with back problems or heart conditions.

Special Notes

Minimum age is 10 years. Maximum weight is 220 lbs. Participants must be in good physical condition and this tour is not recommended for those with back problems or heart conditions. Helicopter, Waterfalls & Hawaiian BBQ

ITO-805 Approximately 6 hours / From \$429



Board your tour vehicle for the brief transfer to the airport and your helicopter over-flight.

Soar south from Hilo to the lava fields and craters of Kilauea Volcano, one of the five shield volcanoes that form the Big Island. Today, Kilauea remains one of the most active volcanoes in the world - it is the longest continuously erupting volcano on the planet. During your flight, watch the Hawaiian rainforest give way to black basalt formations created by millennia of eruptions and look for surface lava flows. Little wonder that native Hawaiians considered the mountain the home of Pele, Goddess of Fire. Following your volcano over-flight, head north and cruise over Hilo. Enjoy sweeping views of the Big Island's tropical rainforests, valleys and waterfalls.

Returning to Hilo, meet your guide and drive north along the coast. Travel off road on a bumpy gravel cane road to a private pavilion in a remote rainforest valley where a Hawaiian Style BBQ lunch including complimentary beer and French champagne is served beside a secluded waterfall. After lunch, take a 10-minute walk through the rainforest where there's free time for a refreshing swim, or to just relax and enjoy the scenery.

Your return route along Onomea Bay includes a visit to Akaka Falls State Park. A short walk through the rainforest leads past Kahuna Falls to free-falling Akaka Falls. Here the Kolekole Stream, surrounded by dense tropical growth, plummets 442 feet into a deep gorge. Your survey of Hawaiian volcanoes and waterfalls also features a stop at Rainbow Falls near Hilo, where the Wailuku River plunges 80 feet past a lava cave into a turquoise pool.

Return to your tour vehicle and the drive back to the ship.

Special Notes

Wear comfortable closed-toe shoes, clothes suited to the day's weather conditions and bring a swimsuit, towel and adequate sun protection. If the flight portion of the tour is cancelled due to unsafe weather conditions the land portion of the tour will be completed and a partial refund will be given. Tour order may vary.

Honolulu, Hawaii

Home to nearly half a million people, Honolulu is Hawaii's state capital and only major city. The city of Honolulu and the island of Oahu offer a wealth of historic, cultural and scenic attractions. Waikiki Beach and Diamond Head are two of the city's enduring symbols. Pearl Harbor, site of the USS Arizona Memorial and the "Punchbowl," are haunting reminders of the tragic events of December 7, 1941, when the Japanese surprise attack on Pearl Harbor forced America into World War II. Oahu's North Shore

Spend a day discovering Oahu's North Shore from the comfort of your air conditioned vehicle. Designed for those who prefer little or no walking and with plenty of photo opportunities this excursion's for you. During the day, you'll stop for a delicious lunch with refreshing Hawaiian shaved ice at one of the popular shrimp trucks. You may also see endangered wetland birds, including the Black-neck stilt, Hawaiian coot and Moorhen.

Your narrated tour begins as you leave the pier and head out towards Oahu's windward coast. Your scenic route will take you

through the island's emerald green rainforest and the Ko'oolau Mountains. About 37 miles long with its highest peak rising to 3150 feet, the Ko'oolau Mountains are not really mountains at all but remnants of a volcano that erupted over a million years ago.

You'll also stop at Valley of the Temples. The Byodo-In Temple was erected in 1968 to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the arrival of the first Japanese immigrants to Hawaii, and is a replica of the 900-year-old Temple of Equality in Japan. The well-appointed Temple grounds are home to wild peacocks and hundreds of Japanese koi happily swim in the ponds. The peaceful surroundings include a large reflecting pond, meditation niches and small waterfalls.

Near Kaneohe Bay lays the island of Mokolii. Also known as Chinaman's Hat because of its conical shape, it sits about 600 yards off shore and is part of Kualoa Beach Park. A little over 12 acres in size, the little island is home to only three small palm trees.

As you make your way to Oahu's North Shore you'll enjoy many photo stops along the way including Malaekahana State Beach. This protected oasis is considered one of the most beautiful beaches in the islands. Goat Island, a bird sanctuary, can be seen just off shore. Another photo stop is Sunset Beach, one of the longest sand beaches in Oahu; at two miles in length and 200 to 300 feet wide, the waters here are crystal clear and the white sand sparkles. Nearby is Haleiwa Beach Park. As you disembark for photos of this beautiful paradise, be careful, turtles love this place, too. In fact, the beach is home to endangered green sea turtles that rest on the golden sand and feed off the seaweed-covered rocks.

Experience the Ka'a'awa and Hakipu'u valleys on this full-day tour to one of Hawaii's premier attractions, the 4,000-acre Kualoa Ranch. Stretching from ocean to mountaintop, the northern half of the ranch boasts famous movie locations from blockbuster hits like Jurassic Park, LOST, Hawaii 5-0, Pearl Harbor, Windtalkers and more. The southern half includes Hakipu'u, an 800-year old Moli'i fishpond, Secret Island and endless coastal views.

Begin your day of exploration with the scenic drive from the pier to Kualoa Ranch. Here, you'll transfer to your tour vehicle, an open-air rustic school-style bus (which adds to the charm), and start your narrated tour of Kualoa's movie sites. Traveling through the gorgeous 1,000-acre Ka'a'awa Valley, your guide will point out and discuss the background of several noted movie locations.

You can check out the Jurassic Park site, find Godzilla's footprints, and see the famous battlefield from the movie Windtalkers. Listen as your guides tell you about Pearl Harbor, 50 First Dates, George of the Jungle, You, Me & Dupree and LOST! As you head back to Kualoa Ranch headquarters, you'll have the opportunity to sit down in the restaurant for a delicious buffet lunch. Enjoy BBQ pork ribs, mango pineapple teriyaki chicken, Kualoa chili, rice, fresh pineapple wedges, buttered corn and tossed greens. Afterwards, stop by the gift shop to check out the ranch wear, Hawaiian crafts, tasty treats, handcrafted jewelry, artfully designed wood carvings and a great selection of items for the keiki (child).

Leaving the "Backlot of Hawaii", you'll board a six-wheel drive Swiss Pinzgauer for a narrated jungle expedition through historic Hakipu'u. Relax while your guides fill you in on the Kualoa family's efforts to restore forests, save endangered native fauna, and re-create traditional agricultural enterprises. For generations, lo'i provided the Hawaiian people with a staple food made from Kalo (also known as the taro plant). Steaming and pounding the kalo made pa'i 'ai (hard, pounded, and undiluted taro). When water was added to smooth out the pounded kalo, it became poi.

With the influx of foreigners to the islands, kalo cultivation sharply declined throughout the 19th century. Many factors contributed to this decline some of which were the introduction of new crops like rice, the loss of land by the maka'inana (commoners), the introduction of capitalism, and the urbanization of Hawai'i. With the resurgence of Hawaiian culture, many people have participated in the restoration of lo'i around the islands.

Take this all in as your personal guide maneuvers through isolated stream beds to tackle some rough terrain and ascend a hill to a panoramic viewpoint. Grab your camera before disembarking. You will be greeted by one of the most dramatic views of the windward coast line, where lush undeveloped tropical valleys stretch out before you. To complete this immersive Hawaiian adventure, you'll re-board your transportation and enjoy the sights and sounds of the return trip to the pier.

Journey to the 75-acre Waimanalo Bay Recreation Area and Waimanalo Beach, a beautiful white sandy shoreline that slopes gently into the ocean providing a wonderful area for swimming and other water recreation.

Continue along Oahu's windward coast and travel a narrow road that winds through lush tropical forest growing on stratified cliffs on your way to the Pali Lookout in the rugged Ko'olau Mountains. This stunning lookout with fierce winds and awe-inspiring vistas of the island is rumored to be the site of a bloody battle in 1795 in which King Kamehameha I forced thousands of his opponents to jump to their deaths from the cliffs there.

Iolani Palace & Queen Emma's Summer Palace

Hawaii's monarchy was established after the first Polynesian settlers arrived in 1100 A.D. but it wasn't until the 18th century that the Hawaiian kingdom was united under the rule of King Kamehameha I. His descendants would go on to create impressive residences that would rival the palaces of European superpowers. During this four-hour excursion you'll tour the grand Iolani Palace and the charming Queen Emma Summer Palace. Be sure to wear comfortable walking shoes and don't forget to bring a camera to capture the unbelievable sights.

After you board your air-conditioned motorcoach, you'll make your way to downtown Honolulu. Here, you'll find the magnificent Iolani Palace, the only royal residence in the United States and a National Historic Landmark. Completed in 1875, the palace was very modern at the time and boasted indoor plumbing, gas chandeliers (which were replaced with electric lights five years later) and telephones. By 1893, this lovely palace became a prison for Queen Lili'uokalani when her government was overthrown. Once you disembark you'll be led to the palace's State Apartments and Private Quarters, which are found on the second floor. As you walk through the stunning hallways, you'll be mesmerized by the stunning furnishings and library inside the royal suites.

Then, you'll reboard the motorcoach and travel to your next destination. En route, you'll pass the King Kamehameha Monument, which stands in front of the Hawaiian Supreme Court building. Nearby is the acclaimed Kawaiaha'o Church, which is known as the "Westminster Abbey of the Pacific." Distinguished as the first Christian church in Oahu, the building was created in 1842 with 14,000 slabs of coral from ocean reefs.

Next, you'll make a photo stop at the Royal Mausoleum, also known as Mauna Ala, the final resting place of Hawaii's past monarchs and their families. Back on the road, you'll make your way out of the city and into the lush Nu'uuanu Valley, where it rains nearly 300 inches a year. Another photo stop awaits you at Pali Lookout, renowned not only for its breathtaking views but it's also one of the

most important places in Hawaiian history. In 1795, when Kamehameha I was battling Kalanikupule for island rule, their armies fought atop these mountains. During one intense battle, Kalanikupule's forces were forced off the 1,000-foot high Koolau cliff. As you gaze out, you have the perfect vantage point of the steep precipice.

Continuing on, you'll make your way to the enchanting hilltop residence known as Queen Emma Summer Palace. This captivating structure was built in 1847 and is one of the few remaining Georgian-inspired residences on the island. Placed on the National Historic Registry, the interior looks much like it did in Queen Emma's day. The home features a collection of artifacts, furniture and personal items like a tiger-claw necklace from the Maharaja of India and a set of China from Queen Victoria.

At the conclusion of the tour, you'll reboard the motorcoach for the scenic ride to the pier.

Natural Highlights & Oahu's East Side

Drive into the world famous Diamond Head, an extinct volcano named by sailors in the 1800s who, from a distance, mistook the glitter of calcite crystals in the lava rock for diamonds. The crater is so massive it became the site of a concealed fort, Fort Rutger, after Hawaii was annexed by the United States in 1898.

Continue past the residential area of Kahala and enjoy a stop at the breathtaking Hanauma Bay, a curved bay formed when the side of a crater collapsed thousands of years ago. Boasting pristine white sands and crystal blue waters, this protected cove (which is also a marine preserve) features a large, rich coral reef that is home to an amazing array of sea life.

Travel past the Halona Point and the famous blowhole where, when tide conditions are right, waves surging through a submerged lava tube erupt in a spectacular geyser of sea water! Keep a keen eye out from January through May for a glimpse of giant humpback whales that frequent the waters here and green sea turtles year-round.

Take in the dramatic panoramic views from the cliff at Makapu'u Point. Rising 647 feet above the ocean, Makapu'u (meaning "bulging eye" in Hawaiian) was created as the result of several lava flows and is the site of a prominent lighthouse.

Explore the ancient war temple of Ulupo Heiau located in Kailua. It is the second largest heiau (temple) on the island of Oahu and is said to have been built during the 1400s by the menehune (little people). By its shape, it is thought to have been a luakini (sacrificial/political) temple.

Travel to higher altitudes to take in breathtaking views of the island's lush windward side from the Pali Lookout in the rugged Ko'olau Mountains. This stunning lookout was the site of a bloody battle in 1795 in which King Kamehameha I forced hundreds of his opponents to jump to their deaths from the cliffs there in what was called the "Battle of the Leaping Fish."

As your visually-compelling adventure comes to an end, sit back, relax and contemplate the beauty that is the Polynesian jewel of Oahu on your scenic and relaxing ride back to your Princess ship in the glistening waters of the harbor.

Kauai (Nawiliwili), Hawaii

Ancient Hawaiians believed the loud groan emitted by the lava-tube blow hole known as Spouting Horn was the voice of the angry goddess Kaikapu. Legend has it that this coast was once guarded by a large mo'o, or lizard, whom ate everyone who tried to fish or swim here.

One day, a man named Liko entered the water. When the mo'o went to attack him, he swam under the lava shelf and escaped through the hole. The mo'o became stuck and was never able to get out. The groaning is the cry of hunger and pain from the lizard that is still trapped under the rocks.

There used to be a much larger blowhole called Kukuilu Seaplume adjacent to Spouting Horn. It shot water 200-feet into the air. However, as the salt spray damaged a nearby field of sugar cane, the hole was blasted away in the 1920's.

Thankfully, Spouting Horn remains and when the tide is right, waves surge through the submerged lava tube and erupt in a spectacular geyser of sea water, treating visitors to a stunning show.

Another highlight of Kauai's extraordinary topography is Waimea Canyon. The largest canyon in the Pacific, it is an astounding sight. Ten miles long, 1 mile wide and 3,500-feet deep, it was carved thousands of years ago by rivers and floods flowing from the summit of Mount Waialeale.

The lines in the canyon walls depict different volcanic eruptions and lava flows that have occurred over the centuries. Though smaller than the Grand Canyon of Arizona, Waimea Canyon rivals its more famous counterpart in scenic beauty.

Numerous lookouts and hikes offer terrific views of every aspect of this natural wonder. The canyon is protected by the Koke'e State Park which encompasses 4,345 acres of land and has 45 miles of trails that run through the canyon and the nearby Alakai Swamp. During an approximate 1½-hour ride, you'll ride through the ancient Maha'ulepu area popular now to beach goers, windsurfers and local fishermen. You'll experience a variety of scenery and terrain; from pasture ranch land and farm crops to coastal and mountain vistas. You'll cross over a sand bar and stream and travel past beaches and bays.

The magic of Hawaii beckons to you around every bend of the trail. Gaze at sand-dune cliffs, Kiawe trees, limestone formations and rocky inlets that are an occasional safe haven for marine life. Maha'ulepu Beach is remote and rugged, a sacred sanctuary that has drawn popular conservation efforts. With the return drive back to the pier, your half-day adventure is complete.

Medical Restriction

Off the Beaten Path

Kilohana Crater & Maha'ulepu Coast by 4WD

LIH-505 Approximately 4 hours / From \$99



Board your air-conditioned, 12-passenger van and travel mainly on unpaved private roads through a former sugarcane plantation to Kilohana Crater. At an elevation of 1,250 feet, the gentle slopes of the crater are covered with varying vegetation.

On the way up, watch Mother Nature change her palette, as your guide relates the history and culture of Kauai. Closer to the crater rim you'll begin to notice the colorful hues of rat berries, guava and wild orchids. Along the road, keep an eye out for wild pigs and pheasants.

Looking East, you can gaze across the one-half-mile wide crater. Now filled with vegetation, wild pigs make their home in this wild, primeval land. From the viewpoint on the western rim of the crater, you can take in a 360-degree view of the eastern part of the island.

As you continue on your way to the historic town of Koloa, you'll drive through a lush tunnel of mahogany eucalyptus trees planted a century ago. It leads to the town's former sugar mill and its famed cane tunnel.

Once in Koloa, the huge banyan tree that holds court in the town center will astonish you. The entire town, founded in 1835, is a living history museum as it contains some of the oldest buildings in the state. The sugar mill, with its intact stone chimney and 1840s-era foundations, is a National Historic Landmark.

Your tour will continue toward the sea to the Maha'ulepu Cliffs for a short walk on a particularly scenic portion of the Maha'ulepu Trail. Or just find the perfect spot to relax on the beach and enjoy the dramatic ocean and island views.

The terrain here is millions of years old and is held sacred by Native Hawaiians, many of whom are connected to this area by ancestral ties and by continuing cultural uses. It contains the last undeveloped coastline on the south shore of Kauai.

To conclude your tour, you'll drive through the cane tunnel, dug back in the 1940's as a shortcut between the fields and mill. Then follow the backroads down to the harbor, with a brief visit to the Menehune Fish Pond.

Mudbug Waterfall Off-Road Adventure LIH-525 Approximately 5 hours / From \$259



Your senses will go into overdrive on this action-packed Kauai off-road adventure. Twenty-three miles of the island's spectacular south shore are yours to explore aboard a rough-and-ready 4-wheel all-terrain vehicle called a Mudbug (because you're almost sure to get at least a little bit dirty). Your exploration of the back roads connecting Koloa, home to Hawaii's first commercial sugar plantation (Kauai's last sugar mill closed in 1995), with the stunning waterfall at Mount Kahili, begins with a meet and greet with your guides in Old Koloa Town.

Arriving by van at the Mudbug check-in facility, you'll get outfitted with all the gear you'll need from shorts, shirt, bandana and goggles to safety helmet (wear your bathing suit underneath). Then, well-schooled on the safe operation of your fully-automatic Mudbug, you'll set off with your knowledgeable guide for what is sure to be an unforgettable experience. You'll maneuver your jaunty ATV through thick vegetation passing cane fields, crossing hills and streams and enjoying an exhilarating sense of off-road freedom. One of the route's many highlights is a historic 1/2-mile long cane haul tunnel that goes straight through a mountain and then traverses switchback trails deep into the interior of the south shore.

Brief stops along the way will highlight famous movie sites. Scenes from Jurassic Park, Honeymoon in Vegas, Hawaii and Six Days/Seven Nights were all filmed partly on the south shore. And there are plenty of panoramic views to provide photo opportunities along the way. Your destination is a sparkling waterfall that tumbles off the peaks of Mount Kahili, winds its way down jungle-clad slopes and pools invitingly at your feet.

The best possible way to immerse yourself in the surrounding beauty is to jump right in for a refreshing swim. Then to satisfy your hunger and thirst, you'll be treated to a delightful picnic deli lunch. Kick back and enjoy your sandwich, cookies, chips and a drink. While you relax and at appropriate sites along the way, your guides will fill you in on some of the interesting history and cultural background that adds so much to the island's unique spirit.

Its colorful nickname, the Garden Isle, describes the lush vegetation that blankets the island, attracting tourists in droves to view it in its finery. The island is dominated by the summit of Waialeale, an extinct volcano rising more than 5,000 feet in the center of Kauai, now slowly eroding back to the sea. The eroding material, famously known as Kauai's Red Dirt, is rich in minerals to support the overriding vegetation. With the abundant rainfall, Kauai hosts a tropical jungle paradise like nowhere else in the United States. It's a jaw-dropping backdrop for an excursion that comes to a relaxing conclusion with the scenic van ride back to the pier.

Special Notes

Minimum age is 5 years and maximum weight is 320 lbs. Wear swimsuit under your clothes, closed-toe shoes you don't mind getting muddy, and bring a towel, sunscreen, and bug repellent. Clothes for getting dirty are provided. Changing rooms, showers, and lockers are available at the Mudbug check-in facility.

Each Mudbug vehicle holds one driver and one passenger. Drivers must be at least 16 years old (proof of age required).

Tubing the Hanamaulu Ditch System LIH-740 Approximately 3 hours / From \$159



It takes 500 gallons of water to produce just one pound of sugar. The historic Lihue Plantation, one of the oldest sugar cane plantations on Kauai, needed millions of gallons of water every day. Well financed and forward thinking, the owners of the plantation commissioned the Hanamaulu Ditch to bring the necessary water from the mountains to the fields.

The project broke ground in 1870 and the ditch was constructed using sledgehammers, spikes, picks and manual labor. Each tunnel and waterway was constructed a bit differently; some using hand cut rock, grouted and placed by hand and others cut out of existing mountainsides.

Although Lihue Plantation has closed its doors, the Hanama'ulu Ditch System is still providing water to farmers and cattle ranchers of the Hanana'ulu basin. And two miles of this historic waterway are featured on a tubing adventure unlike any other.

Don a headlamp, climb into your cozy rubber tube and sit back and enjoy a ride through history. While this isn't a whitewater adventure, it isn't a lazy water park ride either. The currents are strong enough to move you quickly along, no paddling required.

You'll float in and out of many tunnels, one of which is almost a mile long, with just the headlamp to light your way. Then, at the take-out point, you'll transfer to a special site next to a natural swimming hole, the perfect place for and a swim.

With scenic views of the changing countryside to add visual interest to the adventure, this exhilarating half-day excursion is one the active traveler just shouldn't miss.

This captivating half-day excursion showcasing Kauai's natural beauty is the ideal choice for active explorers with a passion for unspoiled nature.

Begin your tour with a transfer from the pier to the Kayak Shack at Nawiliwili Small Boat Harbor. This is where you'll learn paddling techniques from the friendly, expert staff. Geared up with swimsuit, sunglasses, sunscreen and an adventurous spirit, you'll set off in a stable, two-person kayak for an unforgettable two mile downwind paddle through the lush bottomlands of the gentle Hule'ia River.

Known for its lush greenery, Hule'ia has been the site of filming for a wide range of major motion pictures, including "Raiders of the Lost Ark," "Lost World", and the sequel to Jurassic Park. Established in 1973, the Hule'ia National Wildlife Refuge provides wetland habitat for the preservation of endangered Hawaiian waterbirds, so keep an eye out for the Hawaiian stilt (ae'o), coot ('alae ke'oke'o), moorhen ('alae'ula), and duck (koloa maoli).

As you paddle past the Alekoko (Menehune) Fishpond, you'll learn about this living archaeological site. It provides you with a fine example of the ancient fishing and aquaculture methods that are still in use today. Your backdrop will be the magnificent Haupu Mountain Range, a dramatic and majestic 2000' shield volcano that looms nearby over the river. The area is steeped in legend, and your guides will tell you exciting stories about the supernatural inhabitants of the valley in days gone by.

Now for your next adventure! Leave your kayak behind and set out on a 3/4 mile guided nature walk through a pristine tropical rain forest. This rainforest contains many different interesting communities of plants, birds and aquatic life, both native and introduced. Your destination is an off-the-beaten-path swimming hole and a gorgeous tropical waterfall!

Rather than paddling back 2 miles into headwinds, you'll enjoy a pleasant down-river return to Nawiliwili aboard a truly fun and unique vessel: a double-hulled, powered Hawaiian canoe. Kick-back and soak up the scenery enjoying snacks and cold drinks as you cruise down the beautiful river.

be prepared to get a bit wet from the ocean spray as you skim across the surface of the water.

Before you set off on your adventure, you'll receive a briefing on what you can expect to see, and how to avoid damaging the reef, as well as instruction on basic snorkeling techniques.

Equipped with mask, snorkel, fins and wetsuit, you'll take to the water like a fish. Your tour leader will be snorkeling right alongside looking for exciting sights to point out. Grove Farm & Kauai Plantation Railway LIH-310 Approximately 4 hours / From \$139



Acquired in 1864 by George Wilcox, Grove Farm was one of the earliest Hawaiian sugar plantations on Kauai. The unchanged old homestead is now a living museum with the main house, farm, office, workers homes and private cottages beautifully maintained and nestled in tropical gardens, orchards and rolling lawns.

Tour the gracious old home created by the son of Protestant missionary teachers who helped create the Waioli Mission in Hanalei. Walk through large rooms cooled by breezes from shaded verandas and marvel at the elegant furnishings and Oriental carpets. Magnificent koa wood, wainscoting, ohia wood floors and hand crafted furniture of native woods further adorn the home.

Your tour will linger in the home's spacious kitchen. Here you'll enjoy a delicious treat of Grove Farm Ice Box Cookies (a favorite of Miss Mable Wilcox) and Grove Farm Mint Ice Tea, served by your gracious hosts.

Following the museum visit, drive a short distance to Kilohana Plantation for a ride on the Kauai Plantation Railway. This narrow-gauge railway will carry you comfortably through almost 100 acres of orchards and animal pastures.

Climb onboard the "King Kalakaua style" wooden cars at the Kilohana camp station where you'll begin an informative ride through working fields of sugar, pineapple, banana, papaya, coffee and tropical flowers and hardwood trees that enhance the story of agriculture on Kauai yesterday and today.

The train cars are reproductions of the railway cars of the period of King Kalakaua, who was the last monarch of the Kingdom of Hawaii. He reigned from February 12, 1874 until his death in San Francisco on January 20, 1891.

The cars are elegant with hand finished wood interiors and offer a fascinating ride back through history to the plantation days of Kauai. Your conductor points out many of the more than 50 fruits and vegetables that are growing on the farm, including exotic varieties of pineapple, papaya, mango, and rambutan. Much of the produce that you see growing here goes to Kilohana's renowned restaurant, Gaylord's.

Perhaps the most popular part of the trip will be the farmyard. Friendly goats and other farm animals greet you as you stop to stretch your legs half way through your journey. If you want to, you can feed your farmyard friends a treat; your conductor will give you bread specifically for that purpose!

At the end of your tour enjoy some free time to explore the unique shops and galleries as well as Hawaii's very own Koloa Rum Company gallery & destination tasting room before returning to the ship.

Allerton Garden has been noted by National Geographic Traveler Magazine as one of the top 50 must see attractions in the world.

Next, you will travel by vehicle deeper into the upper Lawai Valley and McBryde Garden exploring areas of this beautiful valley that most visitors don't get to experience. McBryde Garden is over 250 acres of conservation research land and home to over 6000 rare and endangered species of plants collected from throughout the Pacific Basin and the world.

After a delightful deli lunch in the Canoe Garden Gazebo you will have the opportunity to embark on a short leisurely walk on a magical trail with some of the rarest species of plants found in the Garden, to an enchanted tropical rain forest which has a backdrop of one of the most beautiful waterfalls on Kauai.

Once the tour of the garden is complete you will have the opportunity to enjoy the Visitor Center and make a stop at Spouting Horn, one of the most popular attractions in Kauai before heading back to the cruise ship pier.

If you dream of the ideal garden paradise and a unique experience that few get to enjoy, this tour is for you.

And no wonder - Maui boasts stunning landscapes and superb beaches. Mt. Haleakala, a dormant volcano, rises 10,000 feet above the Pacific Ocean. Once hailed as "The Valley of the Kings," Maui's Iao Valley is a tropical paradise dominated by the Needle, a volcanic monolith towering over the valley floor. Then there is Lahaina, once home to a royal court and a raucous port-of-call enjoyed by 19th-century Yankee whalers.

Haleakala means "The House of the Sun." To the Hawaiians, it appeared that the sun both rose from and set in the depths of its massive crater. Today, the centerpiece of Haleakala National Park, it is one of Maui's major attractions.

Note: Lahaina is an anchorage port. Transportation from ship to shore is via the ship's tender service.

You're sure to be struck with awe at the immense scale of the volcanic crater and the vast panorama it commands. Spend time gazing out on the lava sculptures in striking shades of red and yellow, reminiscent of the volcano's fiery past.

The Ali'i Kula Lavender Farm, where 45 different varieties of lavender grow year round. The fresh and invigorating fragrance will fill your senses and uplift the spirit. During your guided garden tour, you will learn about this mystical and mysterious herb, surrounded by vibrant proteas and Tuscan olive trees. Best of all, visit the studio gift shop and discover a variety of quality products and gifts directly from the garden, made with "lavender and aloha" just for you.

Continuing your drive through upcountry Maui, you'll arrive at Ocean Vodka Organic Farm & Distillery. True to their organic and sustainable commitment, discover the importance of organic farming for the conservation of land and ocean, sustainable manufacturing and the production of spirits. Guests 21 years and older may sample the vodka and receive a souvenir shot glass. Those under 21 are welcome to sample deep ocean mineral water and receive a souvenir from the gift shop.

The final stop on your itinerary, Surfing Goat Dairy Farm, offers a tour of the grounds and a glimpse of the whole dairy operation as you learn how goats are milked and view the cheese making area. The dairy produces over 30 award-winning cheeses from fresh creamy chevre and feta to fully-ripened goat cheese in wax. Savor some gourmet cheeses and enjoy a delicious buffet-style lunch. Take in some Maui sunshine and relax in one of the most charming areas on the Valley Isle before the scenic drive back to the pier. Arriving at Lana'i City in the central highlands, you'll have time to explore this charming place founded in the early 1900s as a

pineapple plantation town. All the shops, restaurants and business of Lana'i City are centered around Dole Park. This grassy spot is a popular place for locals to gather and picnic. The towering pines lining the park provide just the right amount of shade on a sunny afternoon.

After a tasty sandwich lunch with beverages at Coffee Works, you'll meet your knowledgeable guides and set off on a drive aboard a roomy, air-conditioned 4-wheel drive vehicle to Kaiolohia, also known as Shipwreck Beach. This windy, 8-mile stretch of beach has wrecked numerous ships along its shallow, rocky channel. But it's the ideal place for a trek with experienced guides to fill you in on the fate of the ghostly 1940s oil tanker that remains beached on Kaiolohia Bay's coral reef as well as the flora and fauna of the region.

Experience a unique ironwood forest and the Kukui Point petroglyphs on your way to the "Garden of the Gods." This mysterious natural red rock formation populated by boulders and rock towers inspires visions of Mars. According to Hawaiian lore, this windswept landscape is the result of a contest between two kahuna (priests) from Lana'i and Moloka'i. Each was challenged to keep a fire burning on their respective island longer than the other, and the winner's island would be rewarded with great abundance. The Lana'i kahuna, Kawelo, used every piece of vegetation in Keahiakawelo to keep his fire burning, which is why this area is so barren today.

The rock towers, spires, and formations formed by centuries of erosion are at their most enchanting at dusk. The setting sun casts a warm orange glow on the rocks illuminating them in brilliant reds and purples. And on a clear day, visitors can see the islands of Moloka'i and Oahu from these high elevations. Be aware that the removal or stacking of rocks is kapu (forbidden).

Value: We endeavor to select local tour operators who provide excursions of the highest quality and we carefully monitor prices to ensure that you are receiving good value. Remember to book early to receive the best possible price.

Q. WHAT DOES PRINCESS DO TO ENSURE MY SAFETY WHILE I'M ASHORE?

A. Our primary concern at Princess is your safety and security. We are in continual contact with authorities concerning any travel advisories that might impact our cruises. If the U.S. State Department advises against travel to specific locations we visit, we would make the necessary changes to the published itinerary. Although such itinerary changes occur infrequently, please understand that these changes are for your own safety and security and are beyond our control.

Despite all of our efforts and in light of recent world events, we remind all of our passengers that they must ultimately assume responsibility for their actions while ashore. In this regard, we would like to remind you of some common sense precautions when visiting ports-of-call:

- Stay in the normal tourist areas and don't travel to out-of-the-way places without the benefit of a guided tour offered through Princess.
- Do not leave any of your belongings unattended in public areas.
- Be generally aware of people and activities around you.
- Do not accept packages from anyone you don't know personally.
- Keep a low profile - dress and behave conservatively.
- Be careful when eating and drinking ashore.

We thank you in advance for following these recommendations, which we believe will enhance the enjoyment of your cruise or cruisetour.

Q. WILL I MISS THE SHIP IF I GO ON A SHORE EXCURSION?

A. One very important feature of taking a shore excursion organized by Princess is that we closely monitor the departures and returns of all our tours. Therefore, our ships do not sail until all of our organized tour transportation has returned, so you can be assured that you won't miss the ship. Please keep in mind that when you make your own arrangements in port, or if you leave an organized tour, we will no longer be aware of your whereabouts; so be sure to schedule ample time to return to the ship before it sails.

Q. HOW DO I RESERVE MY SHORE EXCURSIONS IN ADVANCE OF MY CRUISE?

A. Visit our website at princess.com for the most up-to-date shore excursion information, full tour descriptions and to request your shore excursions up until 5 days prior to your cruise. The Cruise Personalizer is the fastest and most convenient way to reserve your shore excursions. Please keep in mind that you will receive your tickets when you arrive onboard and all of your shore excursion purchases are charged to your shipboard account. Advance payment is not accepted. Since shore excursions have limited capacity, we encourage you to reserve your tours as early as possible to avoid disappointment and confirm the best price. Reservations are processed on a first-come, first-served basis.

You may change shore excursion requests, but be advised that shore excursion prices may change. Requests to add tickets at a later time can be made but these tickets may be at a higher price than those previously booked. If you request a shore excursion which you previously cancelled, these requests will be confirmed at the current shore excursion price, which may be higher.

Q. HOW DO I RESERVE MY LAND EXCURSIONS IN ADVANCE OF MY CRUISETOUR?

A. When you are ready to pre-reserve your land excursions, go to the Cruise Personalizer and have your booking number and credit card information ready to enter. A credit card must be registered for each passenger that wishes to participate on a land excursion and we accept Princess Visa, Visa, MasterCard, American Express, Discover and Diner's Club. Credit cards used to pre-reserve land excursions must be valid through the full length of your cruisetour and may also be used to establish your shipboard account. Although a credit card is required to reserve your excursion(s), guests are able to pre-reserve all of their land excursions with no deposit required. An auto-charge of all pre-reserved excursions will take place two days prior to your first Land Excursion booking. Confirmed pre-reserved excursions can be viewed at any time in your detailed itinerary in the Cruise Personalizer. The Cruise Personalizer will remain open until your cruisetour departure date so you may add or cancel tours prior to the cancellation deadline without penalty. Excursions cancelled once the auto-charge has been processed are subject to a 100% penalty. Note that excursion availability is based on cruisetour date, capacity limitations, and suitable weather conditions. Excursions are subject to change at any time and available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Guests are encouraged to book early as space is limited and flightseeing tours in particular may not be available for pre-reserving right up to tour departure date. Prior to travel, print your Travel Summary which will have a listing of all of your pre-reserved land excursions. You will also receive information on confirmed excursions in your Welcome Envelope upon arrival at each location.

Q. HOW CAN I BE SURE I AM CONFIRMED ON THE EXCURSIONS I WANT?

A. When you book your excursions online at princess.com, you receive an immediate confirmation of the status and price of your requested excursion. The site shows the remaining capacity on all tours, so you know if you are confirmed or waitlisted. To avoid disappointment and confirm the best price, please reserve your excursions as early as possible. If the specific tour time you requested is fully booked, Princess may schedule you on an alternate departure that corresponds with your other tour selections.

If your shore excursion choice is not available, we will put you on a waitlist and attempt to obtain more space on the shore excursion. If you have companions traveling with you in your stateroom or in other staterooms and would like everyone to be on the same shore excursion departure, order all the excursions under one name. Requests made individually, even if at the same time, may cause you to be booked on a different departure than your companions or waitlisted on an excursion for which your companions are confirmed.

Land Excursions can not be waitlisted but we actively request more space wherever possible from our tour operators; if a tour is sold out we encourage guests to revisit the Cruise Personalizer at a later date and they can also check for more availability at the tour desks in our Alaska ports.

Q. MAY I TAKE MORE THAN ONE TOUR IN A SINGLE PORT OF CALL?

A. Yes. In Alaska, Canada/New England, the Caribbean, Panama Canal, Hawaii and Mexico, allow at least 30 minutes between each tour. In all other regions, allow at least 60 minutes between each tour. All tours depart from, and return to, the cruise ship pier. By scheduling the appropriate amount of time between tours, you will have sufficient time to take multiple excursions.

Q. CAN I CANCEL AN SHORE EXCURSION I'VE REQUESTED?

A. Due to the limited capacity and high demand for helicopter flights and private vehicle options, these shore excursions are not refundable unless cancelled by 12:00pm on the day after embarkation.

For all other shore excursions, a "Closing Time for Bookings" for each port of call is listed on the Tour Order Form you will receive onboard in your stateroom. This is the time when the bookings for the tours in that port close and we notify the local operators of the final shore excursion requirements. You may cancel an excursion if it is prior to the closing time whether you reserved in advance or onboard. We cannot cancel a shore excursion if it is past this closing time, nor can we refund shore excursions on which you choose not to go. All shore excursions operate rain or shine unless cancelled by the tour operator.

Q. CAN I CANCEL A LAND EXCURSION I'VE REQUESTED?

A. Due to the exclusive nature and advanced planning required for excursions involving hotel accommodations, airline flights and some flightseeing tours, these excursions are not refundable within 30 days of sailing. A fee will be assessed onboard for any of these tours cancelled within 30 days of sailing.

Land Excursions, pre-reserved through the Cruise Personalizer, may be cancelled up to the Land Excursion cancellation deadline which is two days prior to your first land excursion booking. At the cancellation deadline, all pre-reserved land excursions will be auto-charged using the credit card that you provided in the Cruise Personalizer to reserve your tours. Excursions cancelled once the auto-charge has been processed are subject to a 100% penalty, unless the operator, at their sole discretion, is unable to operate the program due to unforeseen circumstances. All sales of tours booked while on your land tour are considered final at the time of purchase and are 100% non-refundable except in the case of an operator approved cancellation.

Q. CAN I REQUEST TO BE REFUNDED FOR MY LAND EXCURSION.

A. In the event of any excursion being cancelled for reasons beyond our control, a full refund will be made. Land

Excursions that were pre-reserved, charged and then cancelled due to weather or other operator approved cancellation will be refunded using the same credit card used to book your excursions. These refunds will typically be reflected on your credit card statement between 7-10 business days after cancellation. Tours booked while on your land tour are considered final at the time of purchase and are 100% non-refundable except in the case of a cancellation by the vendor. Should any excursion have to be abandoned through force majeure or difficulties en route, the best possible refund will be arranged according to the circumstances.

Q. HOW DOES THE PRINCESS EXCURSIONS PROGRAM OPERATE ONBOARD?

A. Our Shore Excursion Manager runs the onboard portion of the Princess Shore Excursions program. Tour Office staff are available to answer questions and make shore excursion reservations for you. Once onboard in your stateroom, you will find tickets for the shore excursions you reserved in advance. If you have not yet reserved tours or would like to purchase additional shore excursions, you will find a Tour Order Form in your stateroom. You will also find a schedule of daily activities, the Princess Patter, which features important program information including Tour Office hours and the closing time for shore excursion bookings. Remember, tickets are sold on a first-come, first-served basis and space on shore excursions is limited, so book early. A Tour Order Form drop box is located near the Tour Office where you may deposit your order form at any time.

Q. ARE THERE CHILDREN'S PRICES AVAILABLE?

A. Yes, on some tours for children age 12 and under. If you are traveling with children, please pre-reserve the number of child tickets you would like on the Cruise Personalizer. If the adult and child price is the same, please order all tickets as adult. Once onboard the ship or at one of our land excursion destinations, check your tour tickets to ensure you have received the correct number of adult and child tickets. Visit the Tour Office as soon as possible to make any necessary adjustments. Parents are also responsible for bringing a safety seat for their child.

On most helicopter and flightseeing tours, children 24 months of age and older are required to have their own seat. Children under 24 months are considered lap infants and may ride free of charge if the tour operator can accommodate them - with prior arrangement through the onboard Tour Office. Parents must show proof of age to the tour operator for any lap infant. Children under the age of 24 months are not able to participate on a helicopter tour.

Q. ARE PRIVATE SHORE EXCURSION OPTIONS AVAILABLE WHERE I CAN CUSTOMIZE MY TOUR?

A. Yes, in many ports we offer shore excursions that can be customized to your specifications. On these tours you are able to book exclusive use of the tour vehicle (automobile, boat or plane) and tailor the tour to include activities and venues you want to experience.

Due to the limited capacity and highly specialized nature of these excursions, they are not refundable unless cancelled by 12:00pm on the day after embarkation or prior to the booking closing time for the port which is listed on the onboard Tour Order Form (whichever is first). Once onboard the ship, you may be provided with a preference card to advise the tour operator of your selected itinerary and interests. The onboard Tour Staff will gladly assist you and provide recommendations.

Please note these shore excursions are sold per transport, not per person, so only one passenger should make the reservation for the entire group. This is a private arrangement and those accompanying you are the guests you choose; Princess does not match up individual passengers to form a private group for the vehicle. The price listed includes the means of transport and/or private guide and does not include gratuities, meals and attraction entrance fees (unless indicated otherwise) as these will vary based on your choices.

Q. ARE THERE AGE OR OTHER RESTRICTIONS ON TOURS?

A. For most tours, there is no minimum age for children as long as they are accompanied by a parent or guardian. Passengers under the age of 18 years cannot participate without a parent or guardian. Please review the tour description notes for the most current restrictions and any exceptions; a few operators may allow an unaccompanied minor on tour if a waiver is signed by the parent or guardian in the operator's presence. Any other restrictions imposed by the tour operator are listed in the "Special Notes" section of each tour description.

Q. IS A VISA REQUIRED FOR ANY OF THE PORTS I VISIT?

A. Please review the information detailed in the "Itinerary" section of the Cruise Personalizer regarding any applicable visas for your specific voyage.

Q. IS ANY ADDITIONAL DOCUMENTATION REQUIRED TO PARTICIPATE ON SHORE EXCURSIONS?

A. Passports, visas and other documentation may be required on certain shore excursions. Please review the "Special Notes" section of the shore excursion for full details. Notarized written consent is required for children crossing international borders without both parents.

Q. ARE THE EXCURSIONS GUIDED?

A. Yes. All of our excursions include local English-speaking guides except for On Your Own tours and where otherwise noted.

Q. SHOULD I TIP THE TOUR GUIDE?

A. Tipping is a discretionary matter; however, it is customary, if one is pleased with their tour, to tip the tour guide. A

general rule of thumb is \$2 per person for a half-day tour and \$5 per person for a full-day tour.

Q. WHAT TYPE OF CLOTHING SHOULD I WEAR WHILE ON TOUR OR IN PORT?

A. During your cruise, the climate can range from temperate and cool to hot and humid. Please plan to dress in layered, light- to medium-weight clothing and comfortable, low-heeled walking shoes. Since weather conditions may vary, we suggest you also pack a sweater, a light jacket and an all-weather coat. In addition, don't forget a hat or visor, a collapsible umbrella, sunglasses, sun screen and of course your camera and extra film and batteries. Please note that for water-related excursions where we suggest you wear your bathing suit, cover-up and hat, we have placed a symbol next to the shore excursion description.

If you plan to participate on an overland tour and will need to recharge video equipment or use a hair dryer, we suggest you bring an international adapter. Whenever you plan on going ashore, we highly encourage you to leave your valuables and jewelry onboard. While ashore, please take care in protecting your purses, cameras and other personal items. Minimizing personal belongings brought ashore could expedite the security process when reboarding the ship. We suggest you carry a photocopy of your passport when going ashore as you may need your passport number to exchange currency.

Please be mindful that in some of the countries you will visit, the local people may have somewhat more conservative views concerning dress than those to which you are accustomed. Generally shorts, tank tops, and short skirts are not acceptable dress when visiting churches or places of worship. Specific information regarding appropriate dress in these ports is provided with the shore excursion. For all golf tours, collared shirts and either long pants or Bermuda-style shorts are required (no cut-offs, bathing suits, etc.).

Q. WILL I MISS MEALS IF I GO ON SHORE EXCURSIONS?

A. Our wide variety of dining venues, including a 24-hour buffet, means there are always meal options available onboard that fit within the shore excursion timing you select.

Q. IS THERE TIME FOR SHOPPING ON THE EXCURSIONS?

A. Shopping is, for many, an important part of travel and, wherever possible, time for this activity is allowed within the framework of many of our shore excursions. Please note, however, that the actual amount of time available for shopping is generally limited.

Q. DO THE EXCURSIONS INCLUDE MUCH WALKING AND STAIR CLIMBING?

A. All of our excursions involve some walking and some excursions include more walking and stair climbing than others. Walking may be over uneven surfaces such as cobblestone city streets or the rocky pathways of ancient ruins. On many excursions, it is necessary to negotiate stairs. Please keep in mind that many of the buildings you will be visiting may have been constructed well before conveniences such as elevators were invented and have been preserved in their original state. Please refer to our tour symbols with each excursion description for more information and guidance.

Q. WHAT ELSE SHOULD I ANTICIPATE IN PORTS?

A. Keep in mind that some sites you will be visiting are extremely popular among both tourists and locals. Therefore, you may encounter crowded conditions, whether participating in one of our tours or sightseeing on your own. Regrettably, we have no control over this situation. With regard to photography, some venues may prohibit the use of flash cameras, so fast-speed film is recommended. In some places, photography or video may be prohibited altogether or a fee may be imposed. We ask that you observe any restrictions and, if in doubt, ask your guide for assistance.

Q. AM I REQUIRED TO WEAR SAFETY EQUIPMENT ON TOUR?

A. Yes, on certain tours it is mandatory that you wear the appropriate safety equipment in order to participate. Such equipment includes, but is not limited to snorkel vests, life vests, helmets, etc.

Q. WHAT IS REQUIRED TO PARTICIPATE IN A CERTIFIED DIVE TOUR?

A. An open-water scuba certification card must be presented in order to participate in a certified dive tour. Unfortunately, we are unable to accommodate divers with either a Junior Open Water or a Scuba Diver rating due to the depth limitations imposed by these certifications. The sport-diving industry recommends that divers take an update course if they have not been diving within the last six months. Please note that some dive operators may reserve the right to refuse to take divers who cannot provide proof of the date of their last dive or scuba review course. We recommend you bring a log book or proof that you have recently completed a review course.

There are certain medical conditions that may prevent your participation. Accordingly, you will be required to complete a medical-history form and liability waiver/release form that will be supplied onboard or by the tour operator. Following is a non-inclusive list of several medical conditions that may prevent you from safely participating in scuba diving. Any of these conditions would also require an examination prior to your cruise by a qualified physician to obtain written permission to participate in scuba diving activities. Heart disease or previous heart attack, diabetes, epilepsy or seizures, high blood pressure or the need to take medication to control blood pressure, pregnancy, asthma or any form of lung disease, recent surgery, blackouts, sinus problems, fear of closed spaces, recurring complicated migraines headaches, recurrent ear problems, severe motion sickness and presently taking prescription

medicines with the exception of birth control. Passengers are welcome to bring and use their own personal equipment, but it must be stored in their stateroom and there is no reduction in the tour price.

Q. ARE THERE ANY SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR PARTICIPATING IN AN INTRODUCTORY/DISCOVER SCUBA DIVING TOUR?

A. Yes, there are certain medical conditions that may prevent your participation. Accordingly, you must complete a medical history form and liability waiver/release form that will be provided on board or by the tour operator at the beginning of the tour. Following is a non-inclusive list of several medical conditions that may prevent you from safely participating in scuba diving. Any of these conditions would also require an examination prior to your cruise by a qualified physician to obtain written permission to participate in scuba diving activities. Heart disease or previous heart attack, diabetes, epilepsy or seizures, high blood pressure or take medicine to control blood pressure, presently taking prescription medicines with the exception of birth control, pregnancy, asthma or any form of lung disease, recent surgery, blackouts, sinus problems, fear of closed spaces, recurring complicated migraine headaches, recurrent ear problems, and severe motion sickness. For Introductory Scuba Diving tours there is a minimum age of 10. Passengers under the age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

Q. ARE THERE ANY SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR PARTICIPATING IN A SNUBA DIVING, HELMET DIVING OR UNDERWATER SCOOTER TOUR?

A. Yes, there are certain medical conditions that may prevent your participation. Accordingly, you will be required to complete a medical-history form and liability waiver/release form that will be supplied onboard or by the tour operator. Following is a non-inclusive list of several medical conditions that may prevent you from safely participating in scuba diving. Any of these conditions would also require an examination prior to your cruise by a qualified physician to obtain written permission to participate in scuba diving activities. Heart disease or previous heart attack, diabetes, epilepsy or seizures, high blood pressure or take medicine to control blood pressure, presently taking prescription medicines with the exception of birth control, pregnancy, asthma or any form of lung disease, recent surgery, blackouts, sinus problems, fear of closed spaces, recurring complicated migraine headaches, recurrent ear problems, and severe motion sickness. For helmet or SNUBA tours there is a minimum age of 8 years and passengers must weigh at least 75 pounds. For underwater scooter tours there is a minimum age of 10.

Q. ON SPORTFISHING EXCURSIONS, DO I GET TO KEEP THE FISH I CATCH?

A. Most sportfishing tours offered by Princess are part of a catch-and-release program. Fish that are edible and not endangered are typically landed and kept by the boat crew. Please remember you have purchased an opportunity to catch fish, not a guarantee of doing so. As one of our boat captains said, "We guarantee fishing, not catching."

In Alaska only, if your tour is not designated as catch and release, your catch can be processed and shipped home for an additional charge as arranged by the tour operator. Because of its perishable nature and U.S. Customs regulations, your catch may not be sent outside of the United States in most cases. Due to federal regulations, your catch may not be stored onboard the ship, but may be prepared for dinner onboard. Fish caught while at our lodges in Alaska, needs to be shipped home if not part of a catch-and-release program. In Alaska, fishing licenses are required and can be purchased on your boat for \$20 per person in cash (rates subject to change). Fishing for king salmon requires an additional \$10 retention tag (rates subject to change). Children under 16 do not need a license. Fish runs are dependent on spawning seasons, so during May and late-September fish stock may be more limited. Go to www.adfg.state.ak.us for more details on licensing requirements and fishing regulations in Alaska.

Q. WHAT SHOULD I KNOW BEFORE TAKING A HELICOPTER TOUR?

A. Due to weight and balance limitations, as well as passenger safety and comfort, the helicopter excursion companies have advised that passengers weighing 250 pounds or more (fully clothed) will be assessed a surcharge to reserve adequate space onboard the helicopter. The surcharge amount will be indicated in the "Special Notes" section of each tour.

Because of the limited capacity and high demand for helicopter tours, they are not refundable unless cancelled by 12:00pm on the day after embarkation. Children 24 months of age and older are required to have their own seat. Children under 24 months are considered lap infants and may ride free of charge if the tour operator can accommodate them - with prior arrangement through the onboard Tour Office. Parents must show proof of age to the tour operator for any lap infant.

Carry-on bags are not allowed and limited secure storage is provided at the heliport. Helicopters may carry up to six guests depending on combined group weight. The flight length is approximate and flight route may vary due to weather conditions. Helicopter tours may be cancelled on short notice due to weather or safety issues. Warm clothing and sunglasses are recommended on helicopter tours. Dressing in layers is practical and lets you adjust your attire to meet changing conditions.

For helicopter tours in Denali National Park, a surcharge is not charged for guest over 250lbs. The helicopter company will assign aircraft and seats based on weight and balance. While every consideration is made to keep traveling companions and/or families together, this is not always possible for safety reasons.

Q. DOES PRINCESS OWN THE TOUR COMPANIES IN THE PORTS?

A. No, all of the shore excursions are operated by local, independent companies not by Princess; Princess retains a

portion of the total sale. We selected only the most reputable companies available to provide your excursions. The companies providing your excursions are selected by Princess based on their excellent reputation for service and safety.

Q. WHAT DO YOU RECOMMEND FOR PHYSICALLY CHALLENGED PASSENGERS?

A. Our answer, of course, depends on the type and degree of the disability. The goal of Princess Cruises is to provide a safe comfortable cruise experience for all passengers. If you will be using a mobility device during your sailing we strongly recommend you travel with a person physically fit to assist with your needs both onboard and ashore.

If passengers are able to walk on their own, we recommend tours designated as requiring a moderate level of activity. The transport on some tours may be able to accommodate a collapsible wheelchair stored below the bus; scooters or motorized wheelchairs are often too large. If confined to a wheelchair, we would recommend reserving the excursions identified as wheelchair accessible (see Tour Symbols listed for each tour) or a private vehicle shore excursion. We also recommend that non-ambulatory passengers be accompanied by someone who is able to assist them throughout the duration of their day. Our Tour Staff can provide more information on touring options for non-ambulatory guests. Physically challenged passengers participating on a shore excursion must contact the Tour Office at least 48 hours prior to your excursion to ensure arrangements can be made to meet your particular needs.

Embarking and disembarking can be challenging for those with limited mobility. Many major ports of call provide easy access for wheelchairs and scooters. However due to various conditions: steepness of the gangway, weather, shoreside facilities and tidal and sea conditions, passengers using mobility devices may be required to transfer to a stair climber or be precluded from going ashore. Princess staff will make every effort to assist but are not allowed to individually physically lift more than 50 pounds (22 kg).

Some ports of call require the ship to anchor off shore. Passengers are then taken to shore by small boats or tenders. When tendering is required, passengers using mobility devices will not be transferred into or out of the tender, if lifting in excess of the above limitation is required. Many tender ports do not provide wheelchair access so even if the passenger can board the tender they may not be able to disembark ashore. Again the shoreside facilities, movement of the tender, weather and tidal conditions can also preclude tendering.

The decision to allow any passenger to board a tender or disembark the vessel will be made by the Captain on the basis of the safety and welfare of all involved and is final. If passengers are unable to tender or disembark because of circumstances outlined above there will be no refund or credit for missed ports. While Princess recognizes your disappointment the safety of both passengers and crew takes precedence.

For more information on the terms and conditions for Princess Shore Excursions, please refer to the Special Information section. Every effort will be made to accommodate all passengers on the tour of their choice but, tours are operated by independent local companies and not by Princess. The final determination to let any passenger participate is made by the tour operator and therefore if, in the judgment of the tour operator, the safety or comfort of any passenger is in question, guests may be denied participation. This evaluation may not be able to be determined until meeting directly with the local tour operator.

Special Information

CONDITIONS In selling tickets (including coupons or vouchers) or otherwise promoting or making arrangements for Excursions— whether for air, land or local water transportation; tours; sports or any other recreational activities; shore accommodations or meals or for any service, facility or activity other than onboard Princess' cruise ships – Princess acts only as agent for the independent tour operator supplying such excursions or services. Participation by a passenger in Excursions is conditioned upon such passenger's acceptance of the terms and conditions set forth in the Passage Contract contained in the Cruise Ticket, the Excursion Ticket and, depending on the activity, other documents which, among other things, expressly release Princess from any liability for such participation. Participation may also be subject to the independent tour operators' own terms and conditions.

EXCURSION TIMINGS Departure times for each tour will be listed on princess.com in the Cruise Personalizer. For Shore Excursions, they will also be listed on the Tour Order Form, which you will receive onboard. These have been published according to information from our Tour Operators, but are subject to change should the vessel's arrival time at any port be delayed, or the itinerary for any particular excursion be amended. Please note that the time shown will be the time the last tour vehicle leaves the pier or hotel. Passengers are requested to report to the specified departure location (either onboard ship or shoreside) at the designated time, as delay on your part can interfere with the pleasure of your fellow passengers.

EXCURSIONS WITH LIMITED PARTICIPATION Shore Excursions may be purchased in advance of your cruise departure or onboard ship on a first-come, first served basis. Many of our excursions have limited participation and reservation requests will be processed in the order received. When excursions are fully subscribed, additional requests will be placed on a waiting list in the order received. Land Excursions can not be waitlisted but we actively request more space wherever possible from our tour operators; if a tour is sold out we encourage guests to revisit the Cruise Personalizer at a later date and they can also check for more availability at the tour desks in our Alaska ports.

PERSONAL POSSESSIONS Coats, wraps, umbrellas, cameras, handbags, traveling bags and similar personal articles remain at all times through the tour under the passenger's custody and control. Be careful that you do not leave your possessions unattended at any time in the car or coach in which you are traveling.

PRICES The prices for Excursions are subject to change without notice; are per adult, per child or in some cases per vehicle. Prices are confirmed at the time of booking. All quotations made include conveyance according to the itinerary and, where applicable, meals, refreshments, guides and entrance fees, unless otherwise stated. Children, other than infants in arms, will be charged full fare unless noted otherwise.

SHOPPING Where possible, time for shopping has been allowed within the framework of some excursions. However, excursions are not primarily designed for shopping, and time allowed for this purpose may be limited.

REFUNDS No refunds can be made on any ticket, coupon or voucher unless notice of cancellation is given before the closing date indicated on the booking form for the excursions involved. The times when bookings will close will be published onboard. In the event of any excursion being canceled for reasons beyond our control, a full refund will be made. However, should any excursion have to be abandoned through force majeure or difficulties en route, the best possible refund will be arranged according to the circumstances. Land Excursions that were pre-reserved, charged and then cancelled due to weather or other operator approved cancellation will be refunded using the same credit card used to book your excursions. These refunds will typically be reflected on your credit card statement between 7-10 business days after cancellation. Tours booked while on your land tour are considered final at the time of purchase and are 100% non-refundable except in the case of a cancellation by the vendor.

TRANSPORTATION Passengers should appreciate that standards of transport vary considerably throughout the world. Air-conditioned coaches are not available in many areas, and in some, local buses are the best available. Cars or taxis are also used at some ports where coach or bus transportation is not available or limited. Passengers wishing to travel with friends should all leave the ship together, as this will help the Tour Staff to allocate them space in the same vehicle. For the comfort of all passengers, smoking is prohibited aboard all sightseeing vehicles.

WITHDRAWAL OF TOURS The Tour Operator reserves the right to withdraw any excursion through lack of demand and to make any alterations that they may deem advisable for the comfort of the passengers, bearing in mind the convenience and best interest of each group.

ECOLOGY & ENVIRONMENT. It is our policy to maintain a positive and proactive position in relation to the environment. We realize that there is much work to be done to achieve our company goals. To this end we are continually striving to increase awareness of any environmental issues that are likely to affect any of the excursions we offer. We work closely with our local agents to convey any environmental messages in our shore excursion programs and therefore ask you to support us in our efforts by respecting the cultures, customs and environmental issues of the various destinations we visit.
