London (Southampton), England


The south of England boasts a dramatic coastline that encloses some of the most beautiful countryside in Britain. The landscape of hills and heaths, downs and forests, valleys and dales, is without rival. Southampton serves as your gateway to the countryside - and to a wide variety of historic sites, national landmarks and charming. And of course, London is a two-hour drive by modern highway.

The United Kingdom's premier passenger ship port, Southampton was home for many years to the great transatlantic liners of yesteryear.

Sightseeing & City Tours

Royal Windsor (Disembarking / Heathrow)

SOU-965 Approximately 5.75 hours / From \$139



After collecting your luggage, you will board the motorcoach at Southampton Docks for a gentle ride through England's most beautiful countryside. Everything you've seen in photographs will come to life; the hedgerows, the thatched cottages and rolling green fields will be a feast for the eyes.

Your guide will narrate your tour as you head to Windsor Great Park, 1,000 glorious acres of stunning woodland, eventually arriving at one of Queen Elizabeth's favorite homes, Windsor Castle.

Here you will enter the courtyard of Lower Ward, which is flanked by pretty St. George's Chapel, and leads to the Round Tower. Your guide will show you around the majestic State Apartments, which boast painted ceilings, panelled walls, enormous fireplaces, antique furniture and paintings. This unique and magnificent suite of ceremonial rooms are still used by the present Queen to entertain visiting Heads of State.

After strolling around this spectacular building you will then cross the courtyard to view one of the most beautiful religious buildings in England, St. George's Chapel. Building began on this striking chapel in 1475 by King Edward IV and took 51 years to complete.

Leaving the castle grounds you will then have a brief amount of free time to explore the main part of Windsor town, which was established back in the Middle Ages. Browse the many shops and boutiques that line the quiet streets of this ancient town before boarding the motorcoach for the airport.

Along the way you will also catch a glimpse of the River Thames, the river that snakes through most of southern England, as well as the country's green rolling fields and cows grazing in the pastures.

Dress in comfortable layered clothing and wear walking shoes. There is a moderate amount of walking required to visit the various parts of Windsor Castle. Windsor can be closed without notice for Royal functions.

This tour does not include a meal. There is free time to purchase refreshments whilst in Windsor. Local currency is required.

The drive between Southampton and Windsor is approximately 1 1/2 hours.

St. George's Chapel is closed on Sundays for religious services.





Guernsey (St. Peter Port), England

The British isle of Guernsey lies just eight miles off the coast of France. The second largest of the Channel Islands, Guernsey possesses a mild climate, breathtaking scenery and a peaceful, unspoiled ambience. All these attributes combine to make it a popular destination for British and French vacationers. Once the haunt of sea dogs and pirates, St. Peter Port is one of the prettiest harbors in Europe.


Castles and forts dot the Guernsey coastline, including German fortifications from World War II. The Channel Islands were the only part of the United Kingdom to be occupied by the Nazis.

Note: St. Peter Port is an anchorage port. Passengers transfer to shore by ship's tender.

Guernsey Island Drive, Little Chapel & Workshops





Board your motorcoach and drive out of St. Peter Port. Cross the island and head towards the dramatic western coast. Here, rocky cliffs alternate with stretches of beach and sand. Travel through the island's center and pass the greenhouses that produce Guernsey's major agricultural exports: carnations and cut flowers. View scenic villages, stone-built farmhouses and picturesque, narrow country lanes.

Visit the famous Little Chapel of Guernsey. Set in quiet countryside along a tree-lined path, lays a miniature church. The Little Chapel was built by hand over many years by Brother Deodat of the Christian Brothers. The church was constructed to resemble the grotto at Lourdes. Made of simple materials, it is beautifully decorated with pebbles, shells and numerous pieces of colorful broken china. The intricate construction of the chapel reflects the skill and devotion displayed by the builder to his faith, and the creation of this historic holy site.

Continue on to the Gold and Silversmiths Workshops. The workshops are situated in a converted barn which dates back to 1582. Take in a close-up view of the traditional craft being carried out before your eyes. The jewelry, featuring exquisite craftsmanship and traditional designs, is on display in the showroom next door, where you will have time to browse for gifts.

Guernsey Island Drive & Sausmarez Manor

GCI-205 Approximately 3 hours / From \$119



Board your motorcoach and drive out of St. Peter Port. Cross the island and head towards the dramatic western coast. Here, rocky cliffs alternate with stretches of beach and sand. Travel through the island's center and pass the greenhouses that produce Guernsey's major agricultural exports: carnations and cut flowers. View scenic villages, stone built farmhouses and picturesque narrow country lanes.

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Continue on to Sausmarez Manor. Enjoy a guided tour of the Manor, and experience a time capsule of Guernsey's changing fortunes over the last seven centuries. The first mention of the de Sausmarez family in relation to Guernsey is in a letter dated 1254 from Prince Edward. The present Manor contains a wealth of fascinating items, including the log from a voyage around the world in the mid-eighteenth century, which culminated in the capture of the world's richest treasure ship. View the Tapestry Room and the bow-shaped Dining Room, which holds a collection of family portraits.

Off the Beaten Path

Sark Island & Horse-Drawn Carriage Ride



GCI-220 Approximately 6 hours / From \$169

Get ready for an half-day journey exploring the island of Sark. Catch the ferry at St. Peter Port for the 45-minute cruise. Sark is the smallest of the four main Channel Islands, located about 80 miles south of the English coast. Only three miles long and a mile-and-a-half wide, the island rises 350 feet above sea level and boasts 40 miles of the scenic coastlines anywhere in the world. Sark is the most fascinating of the Channel Islands, free of cars and all the trappings of modern life.

From the jetty, ascend Harbor Hill via tractor bus to the village of La Maseline. Upon arrival in the village you will be split into three different groups before boarding your horse-drawn carriage for your transfers around the island. Your route passes Sark's small Post Office, the prison, a small stone building with just two cells, and the parish church.

Continue on to explore the gardens surrounding La Seigneurie, the home of Sark's hereditary lord since the 18th century. La Seigneurie was built on the site of the 6th-century monastery of St. Magloire. The present house has been altered and extended over the years with a large Victorian watchtower erected to facilitate signaling between the island and Guernsey. The formal Royal Horticultural Society-recognized gardens are amongst the finest in the Channel Islands.

Return to the village of La Maseline for free time to explore on your own or browse the shops.

German Occupation Museum & Underground Hospital



GCI-210 Approximately 3 hours / From \$119

Board your motorcoach and drive out of St. Peter Port. Cross the island and head towards the dramatic western coast. Travel through the island's center and pass the greenhouses that produce Guernsey's major agricultural exports. Pass scenic villages, stone-built farmhouses and picturesque, narrow country lanes.

Your first stop on this tour will be the Occupation Museum. Starting in June 1940, half of Guernsey's population and most of the school children were evacuated. View a selection of musical instruments, used by some of the 12,000 troops stationed in Guernsey, together with uniforms, weapons and equipment. In the civilian room, the daily life of the remaining islanders can be gleaned from reading the various orders, permits and censored newspapers, complemented by entries from the diaries they kept. Take in a display of a town household in late 1944 represented by a model of an occupation kitchen, and see a horse-drawn ambulance from the same period.

Continue on to the Underground Hospital and Munitions Store. This complex is the largest structural reminder of the German Occupation existing in the Channel Islands. The complex contains a maze of tunnels which cover an area of about 75,000 square feet. Almost invisible from the surface, this vast concrete maze is built under a low hill in the heart of the Guernsey countryside. The hospital was equipped with an operating theatre, kitchen, cinema, staff quarters and wards for 500 patients. In an emergency, the hospital could hold up to 1,000 patients.

Empty today, one can still see some signs of the hospital's previous existence. View the remains of the heating plant, encounter abandoned hospital beds, and see the remains of the cooking arrangements. Along the two main corridors, one can also see the X-ray room, laboratory, staff sleeping quarters, store rooms, cinema and mortuary.

Castle Cornet & St. Peter Port

GCI-380 Approximately 3 hours / From \$79



Enjoy a guided walking tour that takes you along the cobbled streets of historic St. Peter Port. Stroll along the waterfront as your guide regales you with tales of storms and shipwrecks, smugglers and privateers, and the deadly Black Plague that ravaged the island in the 14th century.

Explore the ancient Castle Cornet. Formerly a tidal island like Lihou on the west coast of Guernsey, Castle Cornet was first fortified between 1206 and 1256. In 1339, when a French force seized the island and occupied it for several years, Cornet was besieged and captured.

With the advent of cannons and gunpowder, the castle was remodeled to accommodate this new technology in weaponry. It served as official residence of the Governor of Guernsey until 1672 when a bolt of lightning struck the magazine of the castle, destroying the keep and a number of living quarters. During World War II, the castle became occupied by a small group of German troops. Finally, in 1945, Castle Cornet was presented to the people of Guernsey by the Crown.

Today, Castle Cornet houses the Maritime Museum, The 201 Squadron RAF Museum, and the Royal Guernsey Militia Museum. It also has a restaurant and hosts outdoor theatre performances during the summer months. After touring the castle and its museums, enjoy coffee or tea accompanied by gauche, afruit bread which is an island specialty.

Herm Island Walk

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GCI-385 Approximately 5 hours / From \$79

Get ready for an exciting half-day adventure to a peaceful island, nearly unspoiled by man. Travel to the islet of Herm by ferry and take part in an active walking tour to Manor Village. Following an uphill path past the shops and taverns, enjoy views across the fields and down to the pristine beach below. Continue on the exploratory walk and find distinctive turquoise signposts at junctions giving directions and approximate timings to the next point of interest. At the center of the island, you will arrive at the Manor Village. At the top of the hill above the village lies a cluster of islanders' homes. Here you will also find Herm school and St. Tugual's Chapel with its stunning stained glass windows, providing views of calm and tranquil surroundings, and of Guernsey in the distance.

Return to Harbor Village and enjoy free time to explore Herm's gift shops. The quaint and tiny Herm Post Office sells fascinating stamps which have become collector's items all over the world. Take the opportunity to sample local beer from one of the Channel Island breweries as you relax on the Islet of Herm.

Sark Island & Bicycle Tour

GCI-425 Approximately 6 hours / From \$109



Get ready for an exciting, athletic half-day journey exploring the island of Sark. Catch the ferry at St. Peter Port for the 45-minute cruise to Sark. Sark is the smallest of the four main Channel Islands, located about 80 miles south of the English coast. Only three miles long, and a mile-and-a-half wide, the island rises 350 feet above sea level and boasts 40 miles of the most picturesque coastlines anywhere in the world. Sark is the most fascinating of the Channel Islands, free of cars and all the trappings of modern life.

From the jetty, ascend Harbor Hill via tractor bus to the village of La Maseline. Collect your bicycle and set off on your independent tour. The island's routes and byways are well marked; it's hard to get lost. Cycle past Sark's small post office, the prison, a small stone building with just two cells, and the parish church. Continue along the Rue de la Moinerie to a vantage point overlooking Sark's wildflowers, dramatic cliffs and coastline.

Continue on to explore the superb gardens surrounding La Seigneurie, the home of Sark's hereditary lord since the 18th century. La Seigneurie was built on the site of the 6th-century monastery of St. Magloire. The present house has been altered and extended over the years with a large Victorian watchtower erected to facilitate signaling between the island and Guernsey. The formal Royal Horticultural Society-recognized gardens are amongst the finest in the Channel Islands.

Enjoy free time to explore the village or browse the shops.

Cork, Ireland (Cobh - For Blarney Castle)

Founded in the 7th century by St. Fin Barre, Cork is your gateway to romantic Ireland. Stroll down narrow country lanes or see the Lakes of Killarney. The intrepid visitor may scale the narrow passages of Blarney Castle to kiss the Blarney Stone. The region around Cork is also home to one of the densest concentration of prehistoric monuments in Western Europe. And, in a land where fable and fact blend to become folklore, it was near Cork that the great Tuatha De Danaan, a race with magical powers, was driven underground by the conquering Celts.

Cobh was the single most important port of emigration from Ireland.

Note: Your ship will dock in Cobh which is about 15 miles from Cork.

Blarney Castle & Traditional Town

CB4-100 Approximately 8 hours / From \$219



This unique, day-long tour has been perfectly designed for the first time visitor to Ireland, and begins with a scenic drive through the Irish country side, accompanied by your knowledgeable and friendly guide. Soak up the beautiful countryside with its rolling hills, expansive farmland and colorful houses, before arriving at either Kinsale or Youghal.

The delightful village of Kinsale boasts a broad and picturesque harbor along with a wealth of well-preserved, 18th-century houses. It was off the coast here that the liner 'RMS Lusitania' was torpedoed by a U-boat during World War I. You will be able to spend time independently exploring the town, or enjoying a coffee in one of the many river-side cafes, before meeting at the motorcoach for the next leg of the journey.

Youghal, one of the very few medieval towns in Ireland, still has its walls. Today, this thriving fishing port is popular amongst Irish holiday makers.

From Kinsale or Youghal you will travel through the Irish countryside before reaching Cork City. Enjoy a brief orientation tour of Cork City from the comfort of your coach before continuing to your lunch venue. Enjoy a traditional Irish lunch at a local hotel accompanied by a wonderful group of musicians.

Your next stop on this fabulous day out is Blarney Castle, which sits high above Blarney village. Set in a sprawling park, this romantic ruin was once a stronghold of the McCarthy clan, and features 18-foot thick stone walls. If you are feeling adventurous, you may climb to the top of the castle to enjoy the amazing views. Those who do so, are said to be gifted the power of eloquence.

After touring the castle, you can stroll to the nearby Blarney Woolen Mill Shop to enjoy shopping in this converted mill for traditional Irish goods. The shop here offers Waterford crystal, Irish linen, hand-loomed Donegal tweed, knitwear, bone china and Celtic brooches, so you will be spoiled for choice!

Your day ends with the scenic ride back to Cobh, enjoying the Irish countryside.

Blarney Castle

CB4-200 Approximately 4 hours / From \$119

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This once-in-a-lifetime excursion to Blarney Castle is truly a must-see for anyone visiting this beautiful country. After meeting your driver and guide at Cobh harbor, you will head out through the gorgeous countryside that features colorfully-painted houses en route

to Blarney Village.

Blarney Castle, a true romantic ruin dating back to 1446, is set in wonderful parkland - many weddings, picnics and big events are held here. The castle was once a stronghold of the McCarthy clan, and in some places the stone walls are over 18 feet thick, offering an impenetrable defence against invaders.

Climb to the top of the castle to enjoy the amazing views and perhaps, if time permits, take in the whimsical history of the Blarney Stone. There are many versions of how the stone came to be placed in the castle; the most likely is that it is half of the stone of Scone (which currently resides in Westminster Abbey in London, England), and was brought back from the crusades. It is said to have been given to the King of Munster by Robert the Bruce as a thank you for sending troops to assist him in the battle of Bannockburn.

Some visitors may wait in line for as many as two hours to participate in part of the history of Blarney Castle. Time permitting, the adventurous among you are encouraged to climb to the top of the castle to kiss the famous stone - those who do are said to be endowed with the gift of eloquence. Once you have been steeped in the local history, you will then have time to stroll around the pretty village, enjoying the ambience and wonderful 18th-century buildings.

End the tour with a visit to the Blarney Woolen Mill shop, where you can browse for high-quality Irish goods, including Waterford crystal, Irish linen, hand-loomed Donegal tweed, knitwear, bone china and Celtic brooches. Once you have made your purchases, it will be time to climb back on to the motorcoach for the journey back to Cobh.

Scenic Drive & Irish Coffee

This delightful, laid-back half-day driving tour around the Irish countryside starts when you meet your friendly guide and driver at the pier. From here you will travel alongside the beautiful River Lee, which flows in two main channels around Cork, a bustling town that you will enjoy viewing from your cozy seat on the motorcoach.

Leaving Cork, you will continue through the Lee River Valley, enjoying the lively commentary from your guide as you pass through farmland, crossing small stone bridges, to the delightful village of Blarney on the way the motorcoach will pass Blarney Castle from a distance. The village itself is charming and authentic, having been established in the 18th century so that estate workers who were employed on the land had somewhere to live.

Upon arrival in Blarney, you will visit a local venue for the opportunity to sample an Irish Coffee. You will then have time to stroll the pretty tree-lined square with its vibrant green lawn. Then stroll the short distance to the Blarney Woolen Mill shop, a favorite stop for many visitors who like to purchase high-quality Irish goods. The elegant shopping center is housed in converted mill buildings and you will be able to browse for knitwear, Irish linen, Donegal tweeds, Celtic brooches, and one of the largest displays of Waterford Crystal in the world.

Then sit back and enjoy the poetic Irish countryside once more as you make your way back to the ship.

From here you will travel alongside the beautiful River Lee, which flows in two main channels around Cork, a bustling town that you will enjoy viewing from your cozy seat on the motorcoach.

Leaving Cork, you will continue through the Lee River Valley, enjoying the lively commentary from your guide as you pass through farmland, crossing small stone bridges, to the delightful village of Blarney on the way the motorcoach will pass Blarney Castle from a distance. The village itself is charming and authentic, having been established in the 18th century so that estate workers who were employed on the land had somewhere to live.

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Then sit back and enjoy the poetic Irish countryside once more as you make your way back to the ship.



Rock of Cashel, The Vee & Lismore

CB4-115 Approximately 8 hours / From \$179





Maps at the Heritage Center offer suggested walks around Lismore and points of interest. Just on the outskirts of town is Lismore Castle, one of the most spectacular castles in Ireland. Built in 1185 by England's Prince John, it has been the home of the Duke of Devonshire since 1753. Rebuilt in the Gothic style during the mid-nineteenth century, the Castle sits on 8,000 acres and boasts gardens, farmlands, and forests. Although the Castle is closed to visitors, the beautiful Gardens are open to the public.

By now you have probably worked up an appetite so you will continue out into the awe-inspiring countryside of Tipperary, Ireland's largest inland county. Journey via The Vee, a gap in the Knockmealdown Mountains. The road climbs in a zig-zag course along the Vee and offers a series of magnificent views of the countryside. Renowned for its rich pasturelands, Tipperary boasts the best Irish dairy products in Ireland. Rich in ancient heritage, Tipperary is home to the charming town of Cashel. According to legend, St. Patrick arrived here in the 5th century and baptized King Aengus, who became Ireland's first Christian ruler.

Upon arrival in Cashel, continue to a local restaurant where you will have views of the legendary Rock of Cashel while enjoying a traditional Irish lunch.

After lunch you will visit the Rock, a prominent hill banded in limestone. Atop the hill sits a number of impressive archaeological ruins dating back to the 12th century. For more than 1,000 years the Rock of Cashel was a symbol of power and the seat of kings and churchmen who ruled over the region. As you stroll through the grounds, you will feel a serene silence as you make your way to Cormac's Chapel, a magnificent little Romanesque church consecrated in 1134 for Benedictine monks. Inside, you will discover some of the oldest and most important wall paintings in Ireland. Nearby is the Cathedral. Built between 1235 and 1270, the Cathedral's center features a huge square tower with a turret on its southwestern corner.

At the end of the day, you will climb back aboard your motorcoach for your return journey to your awaiting ship in Cobh.

This half-day tour offers the curious tourist a wonderful opportunity to soak up some of Ireland's most beautiful countryside, as well as the chance to visit a fine example of a 17th-century fortification

The day starts when you meet your driver and guide at the ship's pier for the motorcoach ride through the River Lee Tunnel. Sit back and enjoy the glorious views of farmland, rolling countryside, streams and brightly-painted houses en route to your destination, Kinsale.

This pretty 18th-century village was once an important naval base which has a long and turbulent history. Charles Fort, which dates back to 1677, was built to protect the coastline from invasion from the French and Spanish, and the defeat of Irish forces at the battle of Kinsale in 1601 was a crushing blow in Gaelic history. And it was here in Kinsale that some of the bodies from the tragic RMS Lusitania were brought in 1915, when it was sunk by a German U-boat off the nearby coast. Many of the original 18th-century buildings remain, including Desmond Castle, and you will have a chance to view them as you independently stroll around the village.

Your drive back to Cobh gives you another wonderful chance to enjoy the rolling landscape of fields and hedgerows.

House of Waterford Crystal & Lismore

Board your motorcoach for the drive from Cobh to historic Waterford. Founded in 853 by Vikings, Waterford became Southern Ireland's chief seaport - a position enhanced in the 18th century by the city's thriving glass works. Waterford's ancient fortified walls are still visible - as is Reginald's Tower. Originally built by Vikings during the 11th century, the Tower was rebuilt by Ireland's Norman conquerors, who transformed a temporary fort into an imposing tower with walls 10 feet thick. Today the restored tower is home to Waterford's city museum.

Continue to the House of Waterford Crystal. Completed in 2010, the state-of-the-art center is the home of all things Waterford. Your tour begins with an audiovisual presentation that traces the history of Waterford Crystal from its founding in 1783 by brothers George and William Penrose to the present day.

Then it's time to discover the secrets that have made Waterford Crystal a prized possession for over two centuries. The tour includes a reconstruction of the manufacturing process and shows on a smaller scale how the original factory would have worked. The process began with the making of wooden molds and moves to a close-up view of the glass-making process. Each piece is mouth-blown and shaped before entering the furnace. From there, crystal forms are sculpted and then cut and engraved by master craftsmen. A limited selection of the process a recreated here in the House of Waterford Crystal and is observed from close-up viewing platforms. Questions are encouraged and you may photograph the craftsmen at their work.

The final tour stop is the gallery showroom, where a crystal chandelier lights up a dining table laden with crystals and ceramics. There is plenty of free time to browse among the world's largest display of Waterford crystal, giftware, craft and jewelry collections.

Travel to the charming heritage town of Lismore. Founded in 636 A.D. and renowned as a seat of learning, Lismore would later be plundered by the Danes, sacked by Vikings, and later, conquered by the Normans in 1172. Once you step off the motorcoach, you will have time to discover this fascinating history for yourself as you explore the town on a self-guided tour.

Just on the outskirts of the town is Lismore Castle, one of the most spectacular castles in Ireland. The Castle sits on 8,000 acres and boasts gardens, farmlands, and forests. The Castle is closed to visitors but you will have the opportunity to photograph this impressive Castle before returning to you waiting motorcoach.

Designed by William Burges, considered of one of the greatest Victorian architects, the elaborate Gothic Revival façade features a copper "Resurrection Angel" atop the sanctuary roof. Local legend claims that if the angel ever topples from its place, the end of the world is not far off.

After your city drive head to Midleton and the Jameson Experience Midleton. Distilling was a centuries-old tradition in Ireland, but in the 17th century the British imposed licensing laws, closing down small distillers. John Jameson, a Scots lawyer who immigrated to Ireland, launched John Jameson Whiskey (with an "e" like American whiskey) in Dublin in 1780.

Your visit to the Jameson Experience begins with an audiovisual presentation that chronicles the history of Irish whiskey-making. Then tour the old Midleton Distillery. Founded in 1795 as a woolen mill, Old Midleton was converted to Jameson whiskey production in 1825. Your guided tour explores the distillery's historic buildings. View Old Midleton's restored machinery, displays of period photographs, and dramatic recreations of the distilling process. Your tour concludes with a taste of Jameson whiskey, followed by free time to explore the gift shop. Whiskey is, of course, available for purchase.

Off the Beaten Path

Titanic: Queenstown Story & Cobh Heritage Centre

This active half-day tour around the port of Cobh starts with a stroll around the harbor, accompanied by your friendly local guide who will entertain you with bucket loads of Irish charm and many fascinating nuggets of information. The harbor at Cobh, which is pronounced 'cove,' is one of the most important harbors in Ireland, and its history is entwined with the many great ships and majestic liners that dropped anchor here.

You will visit the very pier from where many excited passengers, including Irish emigrants, boarded the RMS Titanic, for the New World. Setting sail on April 11th, 1912, the Titanic sailed west towards its tragic fate, but it has never been forgotten here as the town itself lost 123 locals. Cobh has always maintained a strong maritime tradition and the old buildings of the port have been carefully preserved, including the offices of the White Star and Cunard Lines. You will have time to walk around this historic area before strolling through the town itself, listening to historical anecdotes from your guide.

Then it's on to beautiful St. Colman's Cathedral, the ornately detailed neo-Gothic building whose spires you can see from the bay. Built in 1868 and finally completed in 1915, it is made of granite and limestone, and features elaborate statues, altars and stained glass window arches. It also boasts 42 bells that ring out on special occasions. The families of departing emigrants would climb the cathedral steps for a last sight of their departing loved ones before the Titanic lifted its anchor.

You will have plenty of time to take pictures during your walk. Then visit a traditional pub where you will have a chance to savor an Irish coffee, a magical and warming combination of whiskey, double cream, strong black coffee and sugar.

Before returning to your ship you have the chance to independently visit the Queenstown Story exhibition in Cobh Heritage Centre. In the mid 19th century over 6 million adults and children emigrated from Ireland with Cobh being the single most important port of



emigration. The exhibition in the Cobh Heritage Centre tells the story of this mass emigration.

En route, you will drive along the Antrim Coast, one of the loveliest coastlines in Northern Europe. You will marvel at the town of Larne, the most modern and the most ancient of places. Next, you will drive to a local hotel where lunch will be served. After savoring delicious Irish fare, you will travel to Dunluce Castle, one of Ireland's most romantic and breathtaking castles perched on the rocky Antrim coast, where you may snap a photo or two.

Your ultimate destination, Giant's Causeway, is next on your itinerary. Renowned for its polygonal columns of layered basalt, the Causeway is considered the Eighth Wonder of the World, and is the only UNESCO World Heritage Site in Northern Ireland. Since it was first documented in 1693, the Causeway Coast has been the subject of much controversy concerning the origins of the Earth.

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Next, you will travel to the Carrick-a-Rede rope bridge viewing point. Spanning a chasm some eighty feet deep, this bridge once consisted of a single rope handrail and widely spaced slats, which fishermen would traverse while holding salmon caught off the island - an endeavor that was not for the faint of heart. Visitors today are delighted to discover that this has since been replaced by the National Trust in 2000 - there is now a more sensible two-railed bridge minus the wide gaps and missing boards.

You will not cross the bridge as your tour concludes with a relaxing return drive to the pier. With Giant's Causeway behind you, you will leave with a myriad of unforgettable memories.



Carrickfergus Castle, Cushendall & Irish Fare









Board your motorcoach and travel from Belfast to Larne, where you'll join the Coast Road. Pass through the seaside villages of Glenarm and Waterfoot en route to Cushendall, hailed as "The Capital of the Glens of Antrim." The lush glens - nine in number - boast trees and ferns not found elsewhere in Ireland. (The glens are actually glacial valleys carved out of the terrain during the Ice Age.)

Your destination in Cushendall is Upstairs at Joe's and its cooking class. You are greeted on arrival with a pot of hot tea or coffee and freshly baked scones. Then, join the restaurant's chef for a hands-on class in baking Irish bread - both wheaten loaves and the famous Irish soda bread. Once your loaves are baking, sit down and sample the restaurant's cuisine along with a cool pint of Guinness.

After lunch enjoy some short free time in Cushendall before rejoining your motorcoach to visit mighty Carrickfergus Castle, one of the best-preserved medieval fortresses in Ireland. Built in 1177 by John de Courcy, the castle played an important role in Norman England's subjugation of Ireland during the 12th century. Indeed, the impressive fortress continued to serve as an important military bastion for nearly eight centuries. During its long history, Carrickfergus Castle survived sieges by feuding English lords, Irish rebels, Scots rebels, and even the French.

After touring the castle, enjoy some free time to explore the town of Carrickfergus. (Carrickfergus means "Rock of Fergus.) Stroll to the Jacobean Knot Garden, a recreation of Sir Arthur Chichester's Garden Walk at Shaftsbury Park. Or, visit the Andrew Jackson Center, which occupies the cottage where the seventh President's parents lived before immigrating to America in 1765.

St. Patrick Centre, Down Cathedral & Saul

You will continue to Saul Church, a replica of an early Christian church that stands on the site where legend has it that Patrick preached his first sermon in Ireland. Your tour continues with a ferry ride for the short crossing to Portaferry on the Ards Peninsula. You will travel alongside the banks of Lough Strangford and enjoy entertaining views of the countryside and farm villages before reaching Grey Abbey for a brief visit. Much of the abbey remains in good preservation today. The abbey was founded in 1193 by Affreca, daughter of Godred the Norse King of the Island of Man, and wife of John de Courcey, the Norman knight who conquered Ulster. 

There is probably no other tale as gripping or tragic as that of the ill-fated Titanic. Nicknamed the "millionaire's special," it was the last word in luxury and signaled to the rest of the world that life in the 20th century would be bigger, faster, newer. Most of Belfast came out to see the Titanic cast off at noon on Wednesday, April 10, 1912. But four days later, approximately 400 miles off the coast of Newfoundland, the 882-foot long ship collided with an iceberg. 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



Many musicians call Dublin home - Bob Geldof and Sinead O'Connor, just to name a few. But the rock band U2, called "the biggest band in the world" by Rolling Stone magazine, has probably shined a spotlight on Dublin more than any other artist. This half-day walk and rock tour explores the group's humble beginnings and visits many of their former venues that dot Dublin.

Your tour begins as you board your motorcoach and head out on a panoramic tour of the city. One of the first sights you will see is the O2, also known as the Point. Today, it's a state-of-the-art amphitheater but when the band recorded "Van Diemen's Land" for the Rattle and Hum album in 1988, it was a 100-year-old train station converted into a music venue.

Then, you will travel across the River Liffey to the Grand Canal Dock area, site of U2's 1981 album October. At nearby Windmill Lane studios, you will disembark for a walk to see where they recorded their first albums. Here, you will find the iconic "U2 Wall," which is covered in tributes from U2 fans from around the world.

Back on the motorcoach, you will pass the 160-year-old National Gallery of Ireland (among the 15,000 works of art dating back to the 13th century is a portrait of Bono by artist Louis le Brocquy). Another site you will see is Fitzwilliam Square. The Square was the location for the making of the "Sweetest Thing" video.

Continuing on, you will pass the legendary Baggot Inn, where many stars such as U2, David Bowie and The Rolling Stones have made both impromptu and planned appearances. Nearby is the Gaiety Theatre, the location for the "Sometimes You Can't Make It On Your Own" video, a tribute to Bono's late father who once performed there.

Be sure to have your cameras ready - the next sight you will see is Dublin Castle. Built on the site of the first Viking fortress in the 10th century, Dublin Castle has been a symbol of British rule for 700 years. The Guinness Storehouse is another popular attraction you will see. Set inside a converted 18th century fermentation building, the building comprises six floors linked by a giant atrium in the shape of a pint glass.

Your next stop is The Clarence, a hotel owned by Bono and The Edge. Enjoy a drink before heading out on a walk to the Project Arts Centre, home to many early U2 concerts. Be sure to check out the Wall of Fame, a tribute to the most important musicians in Ireland. Each artist or group has been dedicated a window and U2's is in the upper left corner.

At the end of the tour, you will climb back aboard your coach for the return trip to the pier.

The lavishly illustrated medieval manuscript contains the four Gospels. The book probably dates to the early 9th century and may have been the work of monks from Iona. The scribes embellished their calligraphy with intricate Celtic designs, human figures and animals. You will view an exhibit on the production of the Book, as well as other exhibits on Ireland.

Your tour concludes with a relaxing drive to the pier. You may opt to stay in Dublin for independent sightseeing (morning departures only); however, you are responsible for your return transportation to the pier.

Following months of restoration work a brand new interactive exhibition area is located on the ground floor of the castle. In this new exhibition the history of the Talbot Family is retold and you will have time to enjoy this before embarking on a guided tour throughout the reception rooms of this magnificent landmark.





The Queen Mother's Castle of Mey

Your adventure begins as you board your motorcoach bound for the Northern Highlands. The lush countryside, and the turbulent history and unique Gaelic language let you know that you're definitely some place like no other. During you journey, you'll stop for morning coffee at the visitor's center you'll pass along the way before continuing on to the Castle of Mey.

Her Majesty, the late Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother, first saw what was then Barrogill Castle in 1952, while mourning the death of her husband, King George VI. Falling for its isolated charm, the Queen Mother renovated and restored it and created the beautiful gardens you'll see today. For almost half a century she spent many happy summers here and shorter visits at other times of the year, until her passing.

While the castle boasts fine furnishings and paintings, the feel is very much that of a private home. Your guided tour visits the castle's apartments, the Queen Mother's bedroom, the library and the castle gardens. Castle of Mey boasts a traditional walled kitchen garden, a conservatory, and the Queen Mother's Shell Garden with her beloved shrub roses.

Constructed on a z-plan, the castle was built between 1566 and 1572. Seen from a distance, its turreted aspect is very striking. The jutting towers and corbelled turrets are typical of that period of the 16th century.

There are numerous gun slits throughout the ground floor, several in the angles of the tower and more at first-floor level. The round arched entrance to the courtyard, on the north aspect is unaltered.

The castle has quite a colorful history. It was built by George the 4th Earl of Caithness for his second son William Sinclair. However, in 1573, his older brother John, who had been imprisoned there for about six years by his cruel father, murdered William. John had been planning an escape, but William found out about it and told their father. John was in turn murdered, and the castle went to the third son, George Sinclair, who founded the family of the Sinclairs of Mey and succeeded to the Earldom in 1789. He changed the name of the castle to Barrogill Castle. The castle then became the seat of the Earls of Caithness for the next one hundred years. The Green Lady, ghost of the daughter of George, 5th Earl of Caithness, Elizabeth Sinclair, reputedly haunts the castle. Having fallen in love with a local ploughman, the unhappy girl was imprisoned in the castle attic by her angry father and, in a fit of despair, threw herself from a window

After your historic visit, you'll know doubt be ready for a break. You'll enjoy a delicious lunch at a small country inn near the Castle before returning to your motorcoach for the picturesque ride back to your ship.

The Earldom of Sutherland is one of the seven ancient earldoms of Scotland and the Sutherlands were one of the most powerful families in Britain with many important matrimonial and territorial alliances. The Earldom of Sutherland was created in 1235 and a castle appears to have stood on the site since then, possibly beginning as an early medieval fort. The name Dun Robin means Robin's Hill or Fort in Gaelic and may have come from Robert, the 6th Earl of Sutherland who died in 1427.

Once you arrive, you'll make your entrance through the grand front door just as the Duke would have done after debarking from his yacht in 1850 and coming up the steep hill in a coach and four. The Duke and Duchess wanted to create a great first impression, and it still impresses today. You'll continue throughout the castle, getting to a glimpse of royal life, exploring the state apartments, bedrooms and nurseries. The rooms feature a superb collection of furniture, paintings including Canalettos, family heirlooms and objets d'art.

Step outside and stroll through the formal 19th-century gardens, inspired by those at the Palace of Versailles in Paris. They were created in 1850 by the architect Sir Charles Barry. He is the same designer who was responsible for the Victorian extension to the Castle and who also designed the Houses of Parliament. Little has changed in the 150 years since they were planted, although new plants are constantly being introduced.

After you visit, you'll re-board your motorcoach for the scenic ride back alongside the meandering firths as you return to the luxury of your ship.

Close to the motorcoach drop off point is the Old Town, which offers a wide variety of shops selling clothing, books, music, arts and crafts, outdoor equipment and more. Inside the Old Town sits the Victorian Market, a covered market that dates back to 1890. In early Victorian times the weekly open-air markets sold everything from fish to cheese; today, the cast-iron and wooden domed plaza is a lovely place to walk and discover boutique shops selling specialty items. For entertainment such as street performers and Highland pipers then stroll over to nearby High Street.

On a cliff overlooking the River Ness, Inverness Castle is another attraction you may wish to see. The castle, made of red sandstone, looks pink under the sun and stands on the same site where castles have stood since 1057. Although the castle is not open to the public visitors can walk close to the building. A circular path meanders along the river and offers one of the most beautiful riverside settings in Britain.

On the outskirts above the city sits Craig Phadrig Fort; from here you can enjoy magnificent views of the Moray Firth, home to bottlenose dolphins.

Before boarding for your return trip back to Invergordon in the afternoon, you may wish to sit and indulge in any one of Scottish delicacies such as Scotch pie (pies filled with minced meat), haggis (made from sheep's intestines - a famous Scottish dish), smoked salmon, cheese or poultry. For those who prefer to have a half a pint of beer with their meal, you can say (with a bonnie wee bit of a brogue) "Leth-pinnt leann, ma 'se do thoil e." However, if you'd like a glass of red wine, just ask for "fion dearg."



Edinburgh Castle, Royal Yacht & Princes Street





Your tour begins in the Visitors Center where photographs and memorabilia bring Britannia's many historical moments to life. City Drive, Floors Castle & Dryburgh Abbey SQ1-105 Approximately 9.25 hours / From \$169



Board your motorcoach and travel south through the Border Country, crossing the picturesque landscape of checkerboard farms and river valleys en route to Dryburgh Abbey, beautifully situated on the banks of the River Tweed.

Dryburgh Abbey is one of four abbeys founded by David I in the 12th century. A frequent victim of the border wars between Scotland and England, the abbey was ultimately destroyed in 1545. Located on a hill, from the moment you set foot on the sacred property, you are immediately struck by a sense of seclusion.

Luckily for visitors, much of the architecture of the abbey still remains to be seen. As you stroll the peaceful grounds and ruins, it is possible to visualize what life must have been like for the monks who worshiped within the abbey's hallowed halls. Of all the buildings, the Chapter House is particularly well-preserved and it is possible to view the dormitory area. The gatehouse is also



recognizable as are a few smaller houses and rooms on the property. Only a small part of the Abbey Church stands, but one can imagine its original structure. In the vicinity you will find the burial ground of Sir Walter Scott.

Your tour continues with a lovely drive through the quaint town of Kelso. The area's cobblestone streets, elegant Georgian-style buildings and French-style open-air markets will charm you.

Drive to Floors Castle, the stately home of the Duke of Roxburghe. The castle has been in continuous use by the family since it was built in 1721.



The charming Lady Stair's House, also constructed in the 17th century, was once a home but now houses a literary museum devoted to the works of Robert Burns, Sir Walter Scott and Robert Louis Stevenson.

You'll recognize the magnificent St. Giles Cathedral, occupying this site since the 9th century, by its towering and impressive spires

and its magnificent stain-glass windows.

Historic Parliament Square, home to the Parliament Building and today's Scotland's courts, is largely unchanged since the 16th century. Here, an equestrian statue of Charles II stands boldly in the middle of the square, one of the oldest lead statues in Great Britain.

Meander through the elegant district of Cannongate with its quaint Tollbooth, now a museum which details life in 18th century Edinburgh. The design on this building has a delightful series of small, delicate turrets.

Standing proudly at the end of Royal Mile is the magnificent Holyrood Palace, the official residence of Her Majesty the Queen while in Scotland. This ornate, baroque palace is famously known as the home of Mary Queen of Scots and within its walls many dramatic episodes of her turbulent reign unfolded.

Your tour includes an opportunity to step inside these hallowed halls for a tour of the royal residence. See the state apartments and their unrivaled collection of tapestries, paintings and antique furniture. Look up and note the fine plasterwork and intricate design on many of the ceilings and be sure to browse the royal gallery featuring exquisitely painted portraits of Scotland's rulers.

At the completion of your tour, the motorcoach will bring you back to port. If you wish to remain in Edinburgh for independent sightseeing, you are then responsible for your own transportation to the ship.





Built on the site of the harbor is the Museum of the Landing Day. The museum commemorates the D-Day landings, with models, dioramas and a short film depicting the monumental exploits and heroic sacrifices of Allied forces in Operation Overlord. Versailles Palace & Gardens

On your guided tour, you'll visit the king's state apartments, seven suites overlooking a courtyard devoted to royal audiences and court entertainment. You'll see the Hercules Drawing room with its elaborate painted ceiling and the Hall of Mirrors, scene of lavish court receptions. You'll also tour the queen's apartments, four rooms decorated in a variety of styles by several queens, including Marie-Antoinette.

You'll walk across the Versailles Gardens to a restaurant located within Versailles Park, where a lunch of chicken supreme a l'ancienne and wine awaits. After a sumptuous French meal, you're welcome to explore the lush palace gardens. The great Le Notre laid out the palace gardens between 1661 and 1700, boasting meticulously planted parterres, bronze and lead statues, vases and ornamental ponds sprouting a multitude of superbly sculpted fountains.

Honfleur

Also on your itinerary is St. Catherine's Church, a 15th-century church built by shipwrights. Today, it's the largest wooden church with a separate bell-tower in France. The bell-tower, also largely built of wood, dates from the end of the 15th century and is now a museum of religious art.

The next part of the tour is on your own. You're free to explore this charming town, replete with narrow cobbled streets, art galleries, sidewalk cafés and traditional craft shops.

Your tour concludes with a drive across the new Normandy Bridge spanning the Seine estuary as you make your way back to the pier.

Your tour begins as you board your motorcoach for a scenic, three-hour drive to the city center.

Upon arriving, you'll disembark at Cour de la Reine near the Place de la Concorde, a favorite place for shopping and sightseeing on the right bank.

You'll spend the half-day on your own, exploring all that Paris has to offer. City maps are provided to help you plan out your day.

Why not visit the Arc de Triomphe, the world's largest triumphal arch, and catch a glimpse of the Eiffel Tower. The Eiffel Tower was built for the World's Fair in 1889, held in celebration of the French Revolution in 1789. In 1916, the first wireless telephones were tested on the tower. Although meant to last for the duration of the World's Fair, the Eiffel Tower still stands today, despite all protests that this huge "object" wouldn't fit into the architecture of Paris. Today, the Eiffel Tower is a beloved landmark of Paris and is the symbol of the "City of Light."

The Cathédrale Notre-Dame de Paris is a supreme example of Gothic architecture, boasting a façade divided into three levels. The first level features three portals or main entrances, each adorned with intricately carved figures and biblical scenes. The cathedral's last great rose window, located above the Galerie des Rois, anchors the façade's second level; the cathedral's soaring towers form the third level. Notre Dame's interior, colored by light from the stained glass windows, inspires awe.

If you're an art lover, the Louvre Museum is a "must," as it's the home of the Venus de Milo and the Mona Lisa.

After a full day of exploring the "City of Light," you'll rejoin your motorcoach along the Cours de la Reine for a relaxing drive back to the pier.

Q. WHAT ARE THE ADVANTAGES OF TAKING ORGANIZED EXCURSIONS?

Either by having your tours organized onboard so you can best maximize your time in port and avoid having to make independent, last-minute arrangements, or by pre-reserving all your excursions at princess.com. Princess is at your service.

Safety: Your safety and security are of the utmost importance to us and they are the primary consideration in the development and operation of our tour programs.

Value: We endeavor to select local tour operators who provide excursions of the highest quality and we carefully monitor prices to ensure that you are receiving good value. Remember to book early to receive the best possible price.

Q. WHAT DOES PRINCESS DO TO ENSURE MY SAFETY WHILE I'M ASHORE?

A. Our primary concern at Princess is your safety and security. We are in continual contact with authorities concerning any travel advisories that might impact our cruises. If the U.S. State Department advises against travel to specific locations we visit, we would make the necessary changes to the published itinerary. Although such itinerary changes occur infrequently, please understand that these changes are for your own safety and security and are beyond our control.

Despite all of our efforts and in light of recent world events, we remind all of our passengers that they must ultimately assume responsibility for their actions while ashore. In this regard, we would like to remind you of some common sense precautions when visiting ports-of-call:

- Stay in the normal tourist areas and don't travel to out-of the way places without the benefit of a guided tour offered through Princess.
- Do not leave any of your belongings unattended in public areas.
- Be generally aware of people and activities around you.
- Do not accept packages from anyone you don't know personally.
- Keep a low profile dress and behave conservatively.
- Be careful when eating and drinking ashore.

We thank you in advance for following these recommendations, which we believe will enhance the enjoyment of your cruise or cruisetour.

Q. WILL I MISS THE SHIP IF I GO ON A SHORE EXCURSION?

A. One very important feature of taking a shore excursion organized by Princess is that we closely monitor the departures and returns of all our tours. Therefore, our ships do not sail until all of our organized tour transportation has returned, so you can be assured that you won't miss the ship. Please keep in mind that when you make your own arrangements in port, or if you leave an organized tour, we will no longer be aware of your whereabouts; so be sure to schedule ample time to return to the ship before it sails.

Q. HOW DO I RESERVE MY SHORE EXCURSIONS IN ADVANCE OF MY CRUISE?

A. Visit our website at princess.com for the most up-to date shore excursion information, full tour descriptions and to request your shore excursions up until 5 days prior to your cruise. The Cruise Personalizer is the fastest and most convenient way to reserve your shore excursions. Please keep in mind that you will receive your tickets when you arrive onboard and all of your shore excursion purchases are charged to your shipboard account. Advance payment is not accepted. Since shore excursions have limited capacity, we encourage you to reserve your tours as early as possible to avoid disappointment and confirm the best price. Reservations are processed on a first-come, first-served basis.

You may change shore excursion requests, but be advised that shore excursion prices may change. Requests to add tickets at a later time can be made but these tickets may be at a higher price than those previously booked. If you request a shore excursion which you previously cancelled, these requests will be confirmed at the current shore excursion price, which may be higher.

Q. HOW DO I RESERVE MY LAND EXCURSIONS IN ADVANCE OF MY CRUISETOUR?

A. When you are ready to pre-reserve your land excursions, go to the Cruise Personalizer and have your booking number and credit card information ready to enter. A credit card must be registered for each passenger that wishes to participate on a land excursion and we accept Princess Visa, Visa, MasterCard, American Express, Discover and Diner's Club. Credit cards used to pre-reserve land excursions must be valid through the full length of your cruisetour and may also be used to establish your shipboard account. Although a credit card is required to reserve your excursion(s), quests are able to pre-reserve all of their land excursions with no deposit required. An auto-charge of all pre-reserved excursions will take place two days prior to your first Land Excursion booking. Confirmed pre-reserved excursions can be viewed at any time in your detailed itinerary in the Cruise Personalizer. The Cruise Personalizer will remain open until your cruisetour departure date so you may add or cancel tours prior to the cancellation deadline without penalty. Excursions cancelled once the auto-charge has been processed are subject to a 100% penalty. Note that excursion availability is based on cruisetour date, capacity limitations, and suitable weather conditions. Excursions are subject to change at any time and available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Guests are encouraged to book early as space is limited and flightseeing tours in particular may not be available for pre-reserving right up to tour departure date. Prior to travel, print your Travel Summary which will have a listing of all of your pre-reserved land excursions. You will also receive information on confirmed excursions in your Welcome Envelope upon arrival at each location.

Q. HOW CAN I BE SURE I AM CONFIRMED ON THE EXCURSIONS I WANT?

A. When you book your excursions online at princess.com, you receive an immediate confirmation of the status and price of your requested excursion. The site shows the remaining capacity on all tours, so you know if you are confirmed or waitlisted. To avoid disappointment and confirm the best price, please reserve your excursions as early as possible. If the specific tour time you requested is fully booked, Princess may schedule you on an alternate departure that corresponds with your other tour selections.

If your shore excursion choice is not available, we will put you on a waitlist and attempt to obtain more space on the shore excursion. If you have companions traveling with you in your stateroom or in other staterooms and would like everyone to be on the same shore excursion departure, order all the excursions under one name. Requests made individually, even if at the same time, may cause you to be booked on a different departure than your companions or waitlisted on an excursion for which your companions are confirmed.

Land Excursions can not be waitlisted but we actively request more space wherever possible from our tour operators; if a tour is sold out we encourage guests to revisit the Cruise Personalizer at a later date and they can also check for more availability at the tour desks in our Alaska ports.

Q. MAY I TAKE MORE THAN ONE TOUR IN A SINGLE PORT OF CALL?

A. Yes. In Alaska, Canada/New England, the Caribbean, Panama Canal, Hawaii and Mexico, allow at least 30 minutes between each tour. In all other regions, allow at least 60 minutes between each tour. All tours depart from, and return to, the cruise ship pier. By scheduling the appropriate amount of time between tours, you will have sufficient time to take multiple excursions.

Q. CAN I CANCEL AN SHORE EXCURSION I'VE REQUESTED?

A. Due to the limited capacity and high demand for helicopter flights and private vehicle options, these shore excursions are not refundable unless cancelled by 12:00pm on the day after embarkation.

For all other shore excursions, a "Closing Time for Bookings" for each port of call is listed on the Tour Order Form you will receive onboard in your stateroom. This is the time when the bookings for the tours in that port close and we notify the local operators of the final shore excursion requirements. You may cancel an excursion if it is prior to the closing time whether you reserved in advance or onboard. We cannot cancel a shore excursion if it is past this closing time, nor can we refund shore excursions on which you choose not to go. All shore excursions operate rain or shine unless cancelled by the tour operator.

Q. CAN I CANCEL A LAND EXCURSION I'VE REQUESTED?

A. Due to the exclusive nature and advanced planning required for excursions involving hotel accommodations, airline flights and some flightseeing tours, these excursions are not refundable within 30 days of sailing. A fee will be assessed onboard for any of these tours cancelled within 30 days of sailing.

Land Excursions, pre-reserved through the Cruise Personalizer, may be cancelled up to the Land Excursion cancellation deadline which is two days prior to your first land excursion booking. At the cancellation deadline, all pre-reserved land excursions will be auto-charged using the credit card that you provided in the Cruise Personalizer to reserve your tours. Excursions cancelled once the auto-charge has been processed are subject to a 100% penalty, unless the operator, at their sole discretion, is unable to operate the program due to unforeseen circumstances. All sales of tours booked while on your land tour are considered final at the time of purchase and are 100% non-refundable except in the case of an operator approved cancellation.

Q. CAN I REQUEST TO BE REFUNDED FOR MY LAND EXCURSION.

A. In the event of any excursion being cancelled for reasons beyond our control, a full refund will be made. Land

Excursions that were pre-reserved, charged and then cancelled due to weather or other operator approved cancellation will be refunded using the same credit card used to book your excursions. These refunds will typically be reflected on your credit card statement between 7-10 business days after cancellation. Tours booked while on your land tour are considered final at the time of purchase and are 100% non-refundable except in the case of a cancellation by the vendor. Should any excursion have to be abandoned through force majeure or difficulties en route, the best possible refund will be arranged according to the circumstances.

Q. HOW DOES THE PRINCESS EXCURSIONS PROGRAM OPERATE ONBOARD?

A. Our Shore Excursion Manager runs the onboard portion of the Princess Shore Excursions program. Tour Office staff are available to answer questions and make shore excursion reservations for you. Once onboard in your stateroom, you will find tickets for the shore excursions you reserved in advance. If you have not yet reserved tours or would like to purchase additional shore excursions, you will find a Tour Order Form in your stateroom. You will also find a schedule of daily activities, the Princess Patter, which features important program information including Tour Office hours and the closing time for shore excursion bookings. Remember, tickets are sold on a first-come, first-served basis and space on shore excursions is limited, so book early. A Tour Order Form drop box is located near the Tour Office where you may deposit your order form at any time.

Q. ARE THERE CHILDREN'S PRICES AVAILABLE?

A. Yes, on some tours for children age 12 and under. If you are traveling with children, please pre-reserve the number of child tickets you would like on the Cruise Personalizer. If the adult and child price is the same, please order all tickets as adult. Once onboard the ship or at one of our land excursion destinations, check your tour tickets to ensure you have received the correct number of adult and child tickets. Visit the Tour Office as soon as possible to make any necessary adjustments. Parents are also responsible for bringing a safety seat for their child.

On most helicopter and flightseeing tours, children 24 months of age and older are required to have their own seat. Children under 24 months are considered lap infants and may ride free of charge if the tour operator can accommodate them - with prior arrangement through the onboard Tour Office. Parents must show proof of age to the tour operator for any lap infant. Children under the age of 24 months are not able to participate on a helicopter tour.

Q. ARE PRIVATE SHORE EXCURSION OPTIONS AVAILABLE WHERE I CAN CUSTOMIZE MY TOUR?

A. Yes, in many ports we offer shore excursions that can be customized to your specifications. On these tours you are able to book exclusive use of the tour vehicle (automobile, boat or plane) and tailor the tour to include activities and venues you want to experience.

Due to the limited capacity and highly specialized nature of these excursions, they are not refundable unless cancelled by 12:00pm on the day after embarkation or prior to the booking closing time for the port which is listed on the onboard Tour Order Form (whichever is first). Once onboard the ship, you may be provided with a preference card to advise the tour operator of your selected itinerary and interests. The onboard Tour Staff will gladly assist you and provide recommendations.

Please note these shore excursions are sold per transport, not per person, so only one passenger should make the reservation for the entire group. This is a private arrangement and those accompanying you are the guests you choose; Princess does not match up individual passengers to form a private group for the vehicle. The price listed includes the means of transport and/or private guide and does not include gratuities, meals and attraction entrance fees (unless indicated otherwise) as these will vary based on your choices.

Q. ARE THERE AGE OR OTHER RESTRICTIONS ON TOURS?

A. For most tours, there is no minimum age for children as long as they are accompanied by a parent or guardian. Passengers under the age of 18 years cannot participate without a parent or guardian. Please review the tour description notes for the most current restrictions and any exceptions; a few operators may allow an unaccompanied minor on tour if a wavier is signed by the parent or guardian in the operator's presence. Any other restrictions imposed by the tour operator are listed in the "Special Notes" section of each tour description.

Q. IS A VISA REQUIRED FOR ANY OF THE PORTS I VISIT?

A. Please review the information detailed in the "Itinerary" section of the Cruise Personalizer regarding any applicable visas for your specific voyage.

Q. IS ANY ADDITIONAL DOCUMENTATION REQUIRED TO PARTICIPATE ON SHORE EXCURSIONS?

A. Passports, visas and other documentation may be required on certain shore excursions. Please review the "Special Notes" section of the shore excursion for full details. Notarized written consent is required for children crossing international borders without both parents.

Q. ARE THE EXCURSIONS GUIDED?

A. Yes. All of our excursions include local English-speaking guides except for On Your Own tours and where otherwise noted.

Q. SHOULD I TIP THE TOUR GUIDE?

A. Tipping is a discretionary matter; however, it is customary, if one is pleased with their tour, to tip the tour guide. A

general rule of thumb is \$2 per person for a half-day tour and \$5 per person for a full-day tour.

Q. WHAT TYPE OF CLOTHING SHOULD I WEAR WHILE ON TOUR OR IN PORT?

A. During your cruise, the climate can range from temperate and cool to hot and humid. Please plan to dress in layered, light- to medium-weight clothing and comfortable, low-heeled walking shoes. Since weather conditions may vary, we suggest you also pack a sweater, a light jacket and an all-weather coat. In addition, don't forget a hat or visor, a collapsible umbrella, sunglasses, sun screen and of course your camera and extra film and batteries. Please note that for water-related excursions where we suggest you wear your bathing suit, cover-up and hat, we have placed a symbol next to the shore excursion description.

If you plan to participate on an overland tour and will need to recharge video equipment or use a hair dryer, we suggest you bring an international adapter. Whenever you plan on going ashore, we highly encourage you to leave your valuables and jewelry onboard. While ashore, please take care in protecting your purses, cameras and other personal items. Minimizing personal belongings brought ashore could expedite the security process when reboarding the ship. We suggest you carry a photocopy of your passport when going ashore as you may need your passport number to exchange currency.

Please be mindful that in some of the countries you will visit, the local people may have somewhat more conservative views concerning dress than those to which you are accustomed. Generally shorts, tank tops, and short skirts are not acceptable dress when visiting churches or places of worship. Specific information regarding appropriate dress in these ports is provided with the shore excursion. For all golf tours, collared shirts and either long pants or Bermudastyle shorts are required (no cut-offs, bathing suits, etc.).

Q. WILL I MISS MEALS IF I GO ON SHORE EXCURSIONS?

A. Our wide variety of dining venues, including a 24-hour buffet, means there are always meal options available onboard that fit within the shore excursion timing you select.

Q. IS THERE TIME FOR SHOPPING ON THE EXCURSIONS?

A. Shopping is, for many, an important part of travel and, wherever possible, time for this activity is allowed within the framework of many of our shore excursions. Please note, however, that the actual amount of time available for shopping is generally limited.

Q. DO THE EXCURSIONS INCLUDE MUCH WALKING AND STAIR CLIMBING?

A. All of our excursions involve some walking and some excursions include more walking and stair climbing than others. Walking may be over uneven surfaces such as cobblestone city streets or the rocky pathways of ancient ruins. On many excursions, it is necessary to negotiate stairs. Please keep in mind that many of the buildings you will be visiting may have been constructed well before conveniences such as elevators were invented and have been preserved in their original state. Please refer to our tour symbols with each excursion description for more information and guidance.

Q. WHAT ELSE SHOULD I ANTICIPATE IN PORTS?

A. Keep in mind that some sites you will be visiting are extremely popular among both tourists and locals. Therefore, you may encounter crowded conditions, whether participating in one of our tours or sightseeing on your own. Regrettably, we have no control over this situation. With regard to photography, some venues may prohibit the use of flash cameras, so fast-speed film is recommended. In some places, photography or video may be prohibited altogether or a fee may be imposed. We ask that you observe any restrictions and, if in doubt, ask your guide for assistance.

Q. AM I REQUIRED TO WEAR SAFETY EQUIPMENT ON TOUR?

A. Yes, on certain tours it is mandatory that you wear the appropriate safety equipment in order to participate. Such equipment includes, but is not limited to snorkel vests, life vests, helmets, etc.

Q. WHAT IS REQUIRED TO PARTICIPATE IN A CERTIFIED DIVE TOUR?

A. An open-water scuba certification card must be presented in order to participate in a certified dive tour. Unfortunately, we are unable to accommodate divers with either a Junior Open Water or a Scuba Diver rating due to the depth limitations imposed by these certifications. The sport-diving industry recommends that divers take an update course if they have not been diving within the last six months. Please note that some dive operators may reserve the right to refuse to take divers who cannot provide proof of the date of their last dive or scuba review course. We recommend you bring a log book or proof that you have recently completed a review course.

There are certain medical conditions that may prevent your participation. Accordingly, you will be required to complete a medical-history form and liability waiver/release form that will be supplied onboard or by the tour operator. Following is a non-inclusive list of several medical conditions that may prevent you from safely participating in scuba diving. Any of these conditions would also require an examination prior to your cruise by a qualified physician to obtain written permission to participate in scuba diving activities. Heart disease or previous heart attack, diabetes, epilepsy or seizures, high blood pressure or the need to take medication to control blood pressure, pregnancy, asthma or any form of lung disease, recent surgery, blackouts, sinus problems, fear of closed spaces, recurring complicated migraines headaches, recurrent ear problems, severe motion sickness and presently taking prescription

medicines with the exception of birth control. Passengers are welcome to bring and use their own personal equipment, but is must be stored in their stateroom and there is no reduction in the tour price.

Q. ARE THERE ANY SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR PARTICIPATING IN AN INTRODUCTORY/DISCOVER SCUBA DIVING TOUR?

A. Yes, there are certain medical conditions that may prevent your participation. Accordingly, you must complete a medical history form and liability waiver/release form that will be provided on board or by the tour operator at the beginning of the tour. Following is a non-inclusive list of several medical conditions that may prevent you from safely participating in scuba diving. Any of these conditions would also require an examination prior to your cruise by a qualified physician to obtain written permission to participate in scuba diving activities. Heart disease or previous heart attack, diabetes, epilepsy or seizures, high blood pressure or take medicine to control blood pressure, presently taking prescription medicines with the exception of birth control, pregnancy, asthma or any form of lung disease, recent surgery, blackouts, sinus problems, fear of closed spaces, recurring complicated migraine headaches, recurrent ear problems, and severe motion sickness. For Introductory Scuba Diving tours there is a minimum age of 10. Passengers under the age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

Q. ARE THERE ANY SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR PARTICIPATING IN A SNUBA DIVING, HELMET DIVING OR UNDERWATER SCOOTER TOUR?

A. Yes, there are certain medical conditions that may prevent your participation. Accordingly, you will be required to complete a medical-history form and liability waiver/release form that will be supplied onboard or by the tour operator. Following is a non-inclusive list of several medical conditions that may prevent you from safely participating in scuba diving. Any of these conditions would also require an examination prior to your cruise by a qualified physician to obtain written permission to participate in scuba diving activities. Heart disease or previous heart attack, diabetes, epilepsy or seizures, high blood pressure or take medicine to control blood pressure, presently taking prescription medicines with the exception of birth control, pregnancy, asthma or any form of lung disease, recent surgery, blackouts, sinus problems, fear of closed spaces, recurring complicated migraine headaches, recurrent ear problems, and severe motion sickness. For helmet or SNUBA tours there is a minimum age of 8 years and passengers must weigh at least 75 pounds. For underwater scooter tours there is a minimum age of 10.

Q. ON SPORTFISHING EXCURSIONS, DO I GET TO KEEP THE FISH I CATCH?

A. Most sportfishing tours offered by Princess are part of a catch-and-release program. Fish that are edible and not endangered are typically landed and kept by the boat crew. Please remember you have purchased an opportunity to catch fish, not a guarantee of doing so. As one of our boat captains said, "We guarantee fishing, not catching."

In Alaska only, if your tour is not designated as catch and release, your catch can be processed and shipped home for an additional charge as arranged by the tour operator. Because of its perishable nature and U.S. Customs regulations, your catch may not be sent outside of the United States in most cases. Due to federal regulations, your catch may not be stored onboard the ship, but may be prepared for dinner onboard. Fish caught while at our lodges in Alaska, needs to be shipped home if not part of a catch-and-release program. In Alaska, fishing licenses are required and can be purchased on your boat for \$20 per person in cash (rates subject to change). Fishing for king salmon requires an additional \$10 retention tag (rates subject to change). Children under 16 do not need a license. Fish runs are dependent on spawning seasons, so during May and late-September fish stock may be more limited. Go to www.adfg.state.ak.us for more details on licensing requirements and fishing regulations in Alaska.

Q. WHAT SHOULD I KNOW BEFORE TAKING A HELICOPTER TOUR?

A. Due to weight and balance limitations, as well as passenger safety and comfort, the helicopter excursion companies have advised that passengers weighing 250 pounds or more (fully clothed) will be assessed a surcharge to reserve adequate space onboard the helicopter. The surcharge amount will be indicated in the "Special Notes" section of each tour.

Because of the limited capacity and high demand for helicopter tours, they are not refundable unless cancelled by 12:00pm on the day after embarkation. Children 24 months of age and older are required to have their own seat. Children under 24 months are considered lap infants and may ride free of charge if the tour operator can accommodate them - with prior arrangement through the onboard Tour Office. Parents must show proof of age to the tour operator for any lap infant.

Carry-on bags are not allowed and limited secure storage is provided at the heliport. Helicopters may carry up to six guests depending on combined group weight. The flight length is approximate and flight route may vary due to weather conditions. Helicopter tours may be cancelled on short notice due to weather or safety issues. Warm clothing and sunglasses are recommended on helicopter tours. Dressing in layers is practical and lets you adjust your attire to meet changing conditions.

For helicopter tours in Denali National Park, a surcharge is not charged for guest over 250lbs. The helicopter company will assign aircraft and seats based on weight and balance. While every consideration is made to keep traveling companions and/or families together, this is not always possible for safety reasons.

Q. DOES PRINCESS OWN THE TOUR COMPANIES IN THE PORTS?

A. No, all of the shore excursions are operated by local, independent companies not by Princess; Princess retains a

portion of the total sale. We selected only the most reputable companies available to provide your excursions. The companies providing your excursions are selected by Princess based on their excellent reputation for service and safety.

Q. WHAT DO YOU RECOMMEND FOR PHYSICALLY CHALLENGED PASSENGERS?

A. Our answer, of course, depends on the type and degree of the disability. The goal of Princess Cruises is to provide a safe comfortable cruise experience for all passengers. If you will be using a mobility device during your sailing we strongly recommend you travel with a person physically fit to assist with your needs both onboard and ashore.

If passengers are able to walk on their own, we recommend tours designated as requiring a moderate level of activity. The transport on some tours may be able to accommodate a collapsible wheelchair stored below the bus; scooters or motorized wheelchairs are often too large. If confined to a wheelchair, we would recommend reserving the excursions identified as wheelchair accessible (see Tour Symbols listed for each tour) or a private vehicle shore excursion. We also recommend that non-ambulatory passengers be accompanied by someone who is able to assist them throughout the duration of their day. Our Tour Staff can provide more information on touring options for non-ambulatory guests. Physically challenged passengers participating on a shore excursion must contact the Tour Office at least 48 hours prior to your excursion to ensure arrangements can be made to meet your particular needs.

Embarking and disembarking can be challenging for those with limited mobility. Many major ports of call provide easy access for wheelchairs and scooters. However due to various conditions: steepness of the gangway, weather, shoreside facilities and tidal and sea conditions, passengers using mobility devices may be required to transfer to a stair climber or be precluded from going ashore. Princess staff will make every effort to assist but are not allowed to individually physically lift more than 50 pounds (22 kg).

Some ports of call require the ship to anchor off shore. Passengers are then taken to shore by small boats or tenders. When tendering is required, passengers using mobility devices will not be transferred into or out of the tender, if lifting in excess of the above limitation is required. Many tender ports do not provide wheelchair access so even if the passenger can board the tender they may not be able to disembark ashore. Again the shoreside facilities, movement of the tender, weather and tidal conditions can also preclude tendering.

The decision to allow any passenger to board a tender or disembark the vessel will be made by the Captain on the basis of the safety and welfare of all involved and is final. If passengers are unable to tender or disembark because of circumstances outlined above there will be no refund or credit for missed ports. While Princess recognizes your disappointment the safety of both passengers and crew takes precedence.

For more information on the terms and conditions for Princess Shore Excursions, please refer to the Special Information section. Every effort will be made to accommodate all passengers on the tour of their choice but, tours are operated by independent local companies and not by Princess. The final determination to let any passenger participate is made by the tour operator and therefore if, in the judgment of the tour operator, the safety or comfort of any passenger is in question, guests may be denied participation. This evaluation may not be able to be determined until meeting directly with the local tour operator.

Special Information

CONDITIONS In selling tickets (including coupons or vouchers) or otherwise promoting or making arrangements for Excursions— whether for air, land or local water transportation; tours; sports or any other recreational activities; shore accommodations or meals or for any service, facility or activity other than onboard Princess' cruise ships — Princess acts only as agent for the independent tour operator supplying such excursions or services. Participation by a passenger in Excursions is conditioned upon such passenger's acceptance of the terms and conditions set forth in the Passage Contract contained in the Cruise Ticket, the Excursion Ticket and, depending on the activity, other documents which, among other things, expressly release Princess from any liability for such participation. Participation may also be subject to the independent tour operators' own terms and conditions.

EXCURSION TIMINGS Departure times for each tour will be listed on princess.com in the Cruise Personalizer. For Shore Excursions, they will also be listed on the Tour Order Form, which you will receive onboard. These have been published according to information from our Tour Operators, but are subject to change should the vessel's arrival time at any port be delayed, or the itinerary for any particular excursion be amended. Please note that the time shown will be the time the last tour vehicle leaves the pier or hotel. Passengers are requested to report to the specified departure location (either onboard ship or shoreside) at the designated time, as delay on your part can interfere with the pleasure of your fellow passengers.

EXCURSIONS WITH LIMITED PARTICIPATION Shore Excursions may be purchased in advance of your cruise departure or onboard ship on a first-come, first served basis. Many of our excursions have limited participation and reservation requests will be processed in the order received. When excursions are fully subscribed, additional requests will be placed on a waiting list in the order received. Land Excursions can not be waitlisted but we actively request more space wherever possible from our tour operators; if a tour is sold out we encourage guests to revisit the Cruise Personalizer at a later date and they can also check for more availability at the tour desks in our Alaska ports.

PERSONAL POSSESSIONS Coats, wraps, umbrellas, cameras, handbags, traveling bags and similar personal articles remain at all times through the tour under the passenger's custody and control. Be careful that you do not leave your possessions unattended at any time in the car or coach in which you are traveling.

PRICES The prices for Excursions are subject to change without notice; are per adult, per child or in some cases per vehicle. Prices are confirmed at the time of booking. All quotations made include conveyance according to the itinerary and, where applicable, meals, refreshments, guides and entrance fees, unless otherwise stated. Children, other than infants in arms, will be charged full fare unless noted otherwise.

SHOPPING Where possible, time for shopping has been allowed within the framework of some excursions. However, excursions are not primarily designed for shopping, and time allowed for this purpose may be limited.

REFUNDS No refunds can be made on any ticket, coupon or voucher unless notice of cancellation is given before the closing date indicated on the booking form for the excursions involved. The times when bookings will close will be published onboard. In the event of any excursion being canceled for reasons beyond our control, a full refund will be made. However, should any excursion have to be abandoned through force majeure or difficulties en route, the best possible refund will be arranged according to the circumstances. Land Excursions that were pre-reserved, charged and then cancelled due to weather or other operator approved cancellation will be refunded using the same credit card used to book your excursions. These refunds will typically be reflected on your credit card statement between 7-10 business days after cancellation. Tours booked while on your land tour are considered final at the time of purchase and are 100% non-refundable except in the case of a cancellation by the vendor.

TRANSPORTATION Passengers should appreciate that standards of transport vary considerably throughout the world. Air-conditioned coaches are not available in many areas, and in some, local buses are the best available. Cars or taxis are also used at some ports where coach or bus transportation is not available or limited. Passengers wishing to travel with friends should all leave the ship together, as this will help the Tour Staff to allocate them space in the same vehicle. For the comfort of all passengers, smoking is prohibited aboard all sightseeing vehicles.

WITHDRAWAL OF TOURS The Tour Operator reserves the right to withdraw any excursion through lack of demand and to make any alterations that they may deem advisable for the comfort of the passengers, bearing in mind the convenience and best interest of each group.

ECOLOGY & ENVIRONMENT. It is our policy to maintain a positive and proactive position in relation to the environment. We realize that there is much work to be done to achieve our company goals. To this end we are continually striving to increase awareness of any environmental issues that are likely to affect any of the excursions we offer. We work closely with our local agents to convey any environmental messages in our shore excursion programs and therefore ask you to support us in our efforts by respecting the cultures, customs and environmental issues of the various destinations we visit.
