Busan, South Korea

The second largest city in South Korea, Busan is your gateway to a fascinating land whose culture is a unique amalgam of old and new. Modern high-rise towers dwarf ancient Buddhist temples. The city's bustling business district offers a stark contrast to the serene grounds of Yongdusan Park. In short, Busan is a microcosm of South Korea, a nation whose startling economic success often obscures one of Asia's most sophisticated and venerable cultures.

Busan was the scene of bitter fighting during the Korean War. The United Nations Memorial Cemetery marks the final resting place for the troops from 16 nations who gave their lives during the conflict.

Sightseeing & City Tours

Haedong Yonggungsa Temple (Guided in English)

PUS-200 Approximately 4.5 hours / From \$89



Accompanied by your friendly local guide, you will board the motorcoach at the pier for the breath-taking journey through glorious countryside, to the beautiful Haedong Yonggungsa Temple.

Without a doubt, this is one of the most beautiful temples in Busan, and its unusual location by the sea, only adds to the peaceful atmosphere. Expect to climb 108 steps to get a closer look at this amazing landmark, which boasts a three-story pagoda decorated with lions. Once inside, your guide will explain the legend of the Great Goddess Buddha, who lives in the sea and is said to appear on the back of a dragon.

Climb back on to the motorcoach for the drive along the beautiful Haeundae Beach. Considered to be Korea's most popular beach, Haeundae attracts many holiday-makers and takes it name from the 9th century Silla scholar and poet Choi Chi-won, who would write from a nearby pavilion.

Continuing along the coastal road, head for Dongbaekseom Island, and APEC House, which was built for the 2005 APEC Economic Leader's Meeting.

Another unique and picturesque location, the building is surrounded by beautiful woods of camellia and pine trees. It regularly hosts international conferences, and along with the many delegates who come here, you will also be able to view the Mermaid Statue, which stands on a rock formation on the shore.

Then there is some time for souvenir shopping as you make your way to the wonderful Gukje International Market which is packed with around 300 shops selling crafts, artworks, and antiques.

After a short browse, head back to the ship squeezing in one last photo-stop at the APEC Light House for views of the impressive 24,000 foot Gwangan Grand Bridge, which was completed in 2003, and is the longest suspension bridge in Korea.

Ja-Gal-Ch'i Market & Beomeosa Temple (Guided in English)

PUS-215 Approximately 3.5 hours / From \$79

This relaxing yet fascinating half day excursion starts with a warm welcome at the pier from your local guide, before an enjoyable drive through the city's northern suburbs, passing by the impressive Municipal Museum.

Leaving the city you will journey through magnificent countryside to the serene Beomeosa Temple, one of South Korea's largest temples, which dates back to 678 A.D.

Cross over an arched stone bridge and mountain brook as you approach the temple's three handsome entry gates, also known as



the 'Gate of the Heavenly Kings'.

You will then wander the grounds, where you can view the temple's graceful 7th century three- stone pagoda, which was built during the Silla era, around 826-836 A.D.

Your guide will also show you the Beomeosa stone lamp, which sits in the temple's grounds and the colorful main temple hall, which was built in 1614.

Climbing back onto the bus you will then head to a lively part of town for your second stop of the day, the wonderful Ja-Gal-Ch'i fish market. This colorful explosion of local culture was established by women peddlers during the Korean War, and has become known over the years as 'Aunt's Market', in their honor.

Today, the market boasts amazing displays of seafood ranging from freshly caught whole fish such as flounder and eels, shellfish and exotic seaweeds. You will have time to wander freely, exploring this amazing slice of Korean life, before getting back on the motorcoach for the relaxing trip back to port.



Beomeosa Temple & Cultural Performance (Guided in English)

PUS-205 Approximately 3.75 hours / From \$89



Your journey begins as soon as you board your motorcoach and make your way through Busan's northern suburbs. Keep an eye out for the Municipal Museum, which is noted for its exhibits dating back to Busan's ancient days.

Then, sit back and relax as your coach ventures into a picturesque landscape of evergreen trees and sparkling streams. Soon, you'll make your way to the lush slopes of Mt. Geumjeongsan. Here, nestled deep in the forest sits the 1,300 year-old Beomeosa Temple, one of the most spiritual spots in South Korea. One of the ancient legends surrounding the temple begins with its name. Translated as "Temple of the Nirvana Fish," it's believed that a fish traveled from heaven on a multi-colored cloud and landed in a well, marking the spot as holy and the future site of the temple. Constructed in 678 A.D., Beomeosa once contained over 360 rooms and more than a thousand monks lived here. The temple was burned to the ground in 1592 when the Japanese invaded but rebuilt in 1602. After crossing an ancient bridge you'll disembark, step down a number of steps and walk towards a set of impressive gates. The first gate you'll meet is called "One Pillar Gate." Constructed in 1614, the gate symbolizes the feeling of oneness you'll feel as you pass through and begin your tour. With the scent of incense filling the air you'll continue on past the 300-year-old Gate of the Four Heavenly Kings. According to Korean legend, the four statues standing inside the gate are guarding the entrance to heaven. Don't be alarmed by their ferocious looks - they're only meant to force unruly spirits to surrender to their will. (But it's believed that they might not let you enter and stroll around the temple grounds if your mind is not peaceful and pure.)

Then, you'll have the chance to leisurely wander around the spellbinding grounds. One of the sights not to be missed is the stone lantern in the courtyard. Erected in the 9th century, the octagonal lantern features a unique double-leaf lotus design and is believed to be a part of the original temple that was destroyed in the fire of 1592. Another must-see is the three-story stone pagoda. Built between 826 A.D. and 836 A.D. the pagoda offers a pearl-shaped stone on its base, engraved corner pillars, and large and small lotus leaves

After your tour, Korean dancers and musicians, dressed in traditional costumes will perform for you before you climb back aboard your coach and travel back on a scenic trip to the port in Busan.

U.N. Cemetery & Busan Museum (Guided in English)



PUS-220 Approximately 4 hours / From \$49

Following a long history of warfare with it neighbor, Japan defeated the Qing dynasty in 1896 and occupied Korea until the end of World War II followed by a civil war. Then, in 1950, hoping to unify Korea under a Communist government, the north launched a surprise attack and quickly gained control of most of the south. The United Nations intervened and sent troops to help South Korea. North Korean troops drove UN forces down the Korean peninsula to Busan but the city was one of the few cities that was not destroyed or invaded during the Korea War.

During this four-hour excursion you'll visit two sites that preserve the legacy of the war and the soldiers who bravely fought for freedom. There will be a moderate amount of walking so remember to wear a pair of comfortable shoes.

After leaving the pier, you'll be joined by a guide who will point out areas of interest along the way to the Busan Municipal Museum. In addition to a large collection of artifacts and exhibits that date back to ancient times, the museum also showcases the city's dramatic role during the war with a compilation of photos and film footage detailing the conflict.

Just a short distance away is the United Nations Memorial Cemetery. Sprawling out over 35 quiet acres, the cemetery was established by the UN in 1951 as a permanent tribute to the soldiers who died during 1950 to 1953.

A stroll through the immaculate grounds will lead you to the Main Gate, dedicated to fallen UN forces by the citizens of Busan. As you gaze upon the structure note that the roofline is said to symbolize heaven and the support columns in the shape of trees signify life. The surroundings are even more poignant as you walk past the neat rows of stone markers that form the final resting place for 11,000 soldiers and medical personnel from over 16 nations.

Continuing on you'll come to the Memorial Service Hall whose steep, triangular roof represents eternity and symbolically conveys the religious faiths represented in the cemetery. Also in the cemetery, you'll find the stone Monument of Dongnae, which was built in 1670 and sits at the south gate. It now serves as a memorial to those who died in the battle of Dongnae during the Japanese invasions of 1592 to 1598.

Shopping is next on the agenda. The Lotte department store is one of the largest in the country and boasts luxury goods, jewelry, electronics, fashion and more. After you disembark you'll have an hour to shop to your heart's content. When you've finished shopping, take a ride up to the 9th floor for spectacular views of the city.

After free time for shopping, you will then board the coach for the journey back to the ship.

Tongdosa Temple & United Nations Memorial Cemetery (Guided in English)

Step back in time on this truly wonderful half-day excursion in the company of your knowledgeable guide, who is eager to teach you all about the fascinating history and culture of Korea.

After meeting your guide and driver at the port, you will then travel through the city's northern suburbs, passing by the impressive Municipal Museum, and other city landmarks en route to the Tongdosa Temple.

Driving through the pine forest, you will then arrive at a truly unique location, the Tongdosa Temple. Tongdosa means "saving the world through mastering truth", and visitors can enjoy time for reflection at this temple which dates back to 646 A.D. Enjoy the picturesque grounds, centuries-old murals, and Buddhist relics brought from China in the 4th century.

After spending quality time enjoying the temple's peaceful atmosphere, you will then get back on the bus and head to your second location of the day, the United Nations Memorial Cemetery.

Spend quiet time walking through the neat rows of stone markers that form the final resting places for the soldiers and medical personnel who gave their lives during the Korean War.

The cemetery covers over 35 quiet acres and was established by the United Nations in 1951. You will be able to view the stone Monument of Dongnae which was built in 1670 and sits at the south gate. It now serves as a memorial to those who died in the battle of Dongnae during the Japanese invasions of 1592.

After strolling through the park's grounds, you will then board the coach for the picturesque journey back to the ship, through more beautiful countryside.

Tea Ceremony & City Drive (Guided in English)

For passengers who want to discover more about Korean culture, this wonderful half-day excursion is a great place to start.

After meeting your guide at the ship, you will then drive through the commercial district, passing city hall, hotels, banks and department stores before continuing on to Yongdusan Park, in the very heart of Busan. View the Busan Tower, which boasts panoramic views of the city before driving along the narrow valleys that are wedged between the Nakdong River and Suyeong River. Here, your guide who is local to the area, will reveal the region's history as you pass by this dramatic mountain backdrop.

Your will then head to either the Beomeosa Temple, Tongdosa Temple, or Samgwangsa Temple for your first stop of the day.

Beomeosa, one of ten HwaEom temples in Korea, was established to realize the purpose of HwaEom which pursues life full of happiness and generosity. It was founded in 678 A.D., and is home to an impressive 7th century stone pagoda. Samgwangsa Temple, built at the foot of the Baekyang Mountains, boasts spectacular views of the city, while the Tongdosa Temple, founded in 646 A.D., features extensive grounds, centuries-old murals, and Buddhist relics brought from China in the 4th century.

After exploring the serene temple grounds you will then be invited to take part in an ancient tea ceremony. You will be taught the rituals and rules of this important tradition, before enjoying green tea and Korean rice cakes with your hosts.

After you have learnt more about the culture of this wonderful country, you will climb back on to the motorcoach and enjoy the glorious drive through stunning countryside back to your ship.

Busan - Past & Present (Guided in English)

PUS-230 Approximately 4 hours / From \$49

Tranquil yet energetic, modern yet traditional, Busan is a city that embraces its past while keeping its eye on the future. Get to know Busan's many different faces with this four-and-a-half hour excursion that takes you on a tour of the city's past, present and future.

After meeting your guide at the pier, you'll travel into the heart of Busan, South Korea's second largest city. Known as Korea's summer capital for its superb beaches and impressive hot springs, Busan is also famous as a guardian of its history.

Your first destination is a step into the past at the Bokcheon Museum. Inside, you'll find relics and artifacts from the pre-historic era to the Three Kingdom period that spanned from the 1st century B.C. to the 6th century A.D. Among the fascinating exhibits you'll see are displays of ancient helmets, earthenware and weapons excavated from around Busan and the tombs of the nearby burial ground.

A stroll around the Bokcheon Tombs is a haunting reminder of ancient man and their contributions to the area. Over 9,000 architectural gems have been unearthed from this site, many of which can be seen in the museum. Take a stroll around the tombs and see wooden coffins and a few stone coffins covered with stone slabs.

At the conclusion of your tour you'll board your coach and continue on through the city. Your next stop is a walk into the present. Situated on the northern side of Yongdusan Park, the Modern History Museum details the city's recent history when Korea fell under Japanese rule in the late 19th century.

Shopping is next on the agenda. The Lotte department store is one of the largest in the country and boasts luxury goods, jewelry, electronics, fashion and more. After you disembark you'll have an hour to shop to your heart's content. When you've finished shopping, take a ride up to the 9th floor for spectacular views of the city.

When your exciting tour of Busan's highlights comes to an end, you'll return to your motorcoach, perhaps laden with gifts from Lotte department store, for the relaxing ride back to your ship.

Nagasaki, Japan

For most travelers, Nagasaki is a symbol of the horror and the inhumanity of war. An estimated 75,000 people perished in 1945 when the city became the second target of a nuclear attack. Today, Nagasaki's Peace Park and Atomic Bomb Museum draw visitors from around the world.

But this beautiful city on Kyushu offers other sights. Often described as the San Francisco of Japan, the city occupies verdant hills surrounded by a deep-water bay. For three centuries, Nagasaki was Japan's sole window on the world. The city is also celebrated as the setting for Puccini's opera "Madame Butterfly."

Sightseeing & City Tours

Dejima, Peace Memorial Park & Atomic Bomb Museum (Guided in English)



NGS-100 Approximately 7 hours / From \$199

Board your motorcoach and drive to Peace Memorial Park. The Megami Ohashi Bridge offers sweeping views of the city and the Mistubishi shipyard.

On August 9, 1945, Nagasaki became the second city to suffer a nuclear attack. Peace Memorial Park is located near Ground Zero, the center of the blast, and is home to a beautiful memorial fountain and the 30-foot-high "Statue of Peace." Nearby is the Atomic Bomb Museum, which chronicles the events leading up to the bombing and the event itself. The displays include photographs taken in the city immediately after the blast as well as artifacts that survived the explosion. A short walk from the museum leads to the Atomic Bomb Hypocenter, a black monolith marking Ground Zero.

Board your coach and travel past rebuilt Urakami Cathedral and the famed one-legged Torii gate of the Sanno Shrine. At the time of the blast the cathedral was the largest Christian church in Asia; the shrine's Torii gate was also damaged in the explosion.

Continue to Dejima Museum. Originally an artificial island, Dejima has long been joined to the mainland by land reclamation. For over 200 years during the Tokugawa Shogunate, Japan practiced a policy of strict isolation from the outside world. The outpost of Dutch merchants on Dejima Island was Japan's only contact with the Western world. Tour the Dejima Museum, housed in a blue, colonial era building. The Museum chronicles how the unique Japanese-Dutch trading system worked.

A local hotel or restaurant is the setting for a Japanese style lunch.

After lunch, walk up to the Glover Garden. After the Meiji Restoration, Westerners took up residence in the nearby Foreign Settlement. The Scottish merchant Thomas Glover was an important figure in modern Japan's early industrial development, instrumental in the formation of such iconic Japanese firms as Mitsubishi. Glover Garden provides panoramic views of the city and is the site of seven historic buildings, including Glover's residence, the first wooden Western-style house in Japan.

After your visit you have the option of returning to the ship on foot or remaining in the Foriegn Settlement District for additional sightseeing and shopping. You are then responsible for your return to the ship.

Special Notes

The Atomic Bomb Museum exhibits sensitive material including graphic images depicting the atrocities of war.

This tour include walking up and downhill to visit the Glover Garden. Guests are required to negotiate steps and uneven surfaces at Peace Memorial Park and Glover Gardens. Not recommend for passengers with limited mobility. Wear comfortable, sturdy walking shoes.

Change your currency to Japanese yen before disembarking the ship.

Off the Beaten Path

Shimabara Castle & Samurai Village (Guided in English)



NGS-105 Approximately 7.5 hours / From \$199

Board your motorcoach and travel northeast from Nagasaki, passing scenic Ariake Bay en route to the mountainous Shimabara Peninsula.

Shimabara Castle is situated in the center of this historic old town, and is a superlative example of the classic Japanese castle design known as the Flatland style. Matsukura Shigemasa initiated the construction of Shimabara Castle in 1618 and it took six years to complete. He raised taxes to pay for its construction, which was one of the factors behind the Shimabara Rebellion of 1637-38. Destroyed once, the present castle is a 1964 reconstruction, although the moat and stone walls are from the original structure. The castle is now used as a historical museum centering on the 1637 Battle of Shimabara. Exhibits focus on early Christianity in Japan as well as a collection of swords, armor and cultural artifacts.

A walking tour through the charming cobblestone streets of Shimabara is an opportunity to learn more about the historic area, and a visit to a traditional "samurai village" offers a glimpse into the ways of the Japan's warrior class.

Continue on to a local restaurant and enjoy a Japanese lunch.

Refreshed, depart on a short drive to Mizunashi Honjin. This small village was buried by ash during an eruption of Mt. Fugen in 1991. A few roofs remain visible above the ash and debris, and the area is now a memorial site where the volcano's devastation is preserved.

At the completion of your day, enjoy a picturesque ride back to port.

Peace Memorial Park, Atomic Bomb Museum & City Drive (Guided in English)



NGS-200 Approximately 3 hours / From \$99

Board your motor coach at the pier for a scenic city drive through Nagasaki en route to the moving Peace Memorial Park and the Atomic Bomb Museum. In 1945, an estimated 75,000 people perished when the city became the second target of a nuclear attack. Today, Nagasaki's Peace Park and Atomic Bomb Museum draw visitors from around the world and serve as both a reminder of the tragedy and a memorial to all those who lost their lives.

On August 9, 1945, Nagasaki became the second city to suffer a nuclear attack. Peace Memorial Park is located near Ground Zero, the centre of the blast. It was created to represent the vow that such a tragedy would not happen again and offers hope for world peace. A Nagasaki native created the statue that is the focal point of the park. The 30-foot-high "Statue of Peace" is a symbol of world peace.

After your visit, your city drive continues through to the Urakami Catholic Church. The original structure was built in 1879 after a long ban on Christianity was lifted. When the atomic bomb was dropped it completely destroyed the church. In 1959 this stately Romanesque building was built on the original site. It was remodeled in 1980 and stands as a symbol of persecution. Displayed on the church grounds are statues and artifacts damaged during the bombing.

Peruse the adjacent Atomic Bomb Museum and view the permanent exhibit of photographs taken in the city immediately after the atomic blast. You will also see video displays and artifacts that survived the explosion.



For many visitors, Nagasaki is a symbol of the horrors of war. But this beautiful city on Kyushu offers timeless charm and picturesque scenery as well. Often described as the San Francisco of Japan, the city is nestled within lush, green hills surrounded by a deepwater bay.

A brief photo stop at Mt. Inasa Lookout point is an opportunity to take in wide views of Nagasaki (weather permitting). The port of Nagasaki wraps around the deep blue sea and the mountain slopes are dotted with colourful houses.

Your travel route continues through downtown Nagasaki, past the Atomic Bomb Museum, to the Peace Memorial Park.

On August 9, 1945, Nagasaki became the second city to suffer a nuclear attack. Peace Memorial Park is located near Ground Zero, the center of the blast, and was created to represent the vow that such a tragedy would not happen again and the hope for world peace. A Nagasaki native created the statue that is the focal point of the park. Take a photo of the 30-foot-high "Statue of Peace," which is a symbol of world peace.

Your city drive takes in the historic Urakami Catholic Church. The original structure was built in 1879 after a long ban on Christianity was lifted. When the atomic bomb was dropped it completely destroyed the church. In 1959 this stately, Romanesque building was built on the original site. It was remodeled in 1980 and stands as a symbol of persecution. Displayed on the church grounds are statues and artifacts damaged during the bombing.

Your driving route also passes the famed one-legged Torii Gate. The ancient stone gate stands on only one pillar since the other was blown away by the atomic blast.

A scenic drive brings you back to port.



Arita & Peace Memorial Park (Guided in English)

Shanghai, China



Shanghai is also one of the most fascinating cities on the face of the earth. Its streets are packed with individuals, cars and bicycles, weaving an extraordinary tapestry of humanity. Yet serenity and beauty are always present, be it a class practicing early morning tai chi or the serene repose of the city's jade Buddha.

Shanghai's attractions are legendary, from exquisite temples and superb museums to the Bund's elegant 19th-century European architecture. The city is also your gateway to the Grand Canal and the legendary city of Suzhou.

Shanghai Museum, Jin Mao Tower & Yu Garden

The building's round top and square base symbolizes the ancient Chinese perception of the world as "round sky, square Earth." Next, you'll stop at the Jin Jiang Hotel for a delicious, lunch of classic Shanghai cuisine.

Your next destination is the Waima Silk Museum.



Following your satisfying meal, choose to walk down the 268 steps to rejoin your motorcoach or ride down with the bus.

It boasts several major attractions including "Walking with Buddha" an immersive, multimedia attraction that allows visitors to follow the life of Siddhartha, the man who became Buddha. Also featured is "Monkey's Tale Theatre" a charming and traditional, comic tale.



Macau: St. Paul Cathedral, Museum & A Ma Temple

The only nation in Southeast Asia to escape colonial rule, Thailand offers a rich and ancient culture that flowered unhindered by Western influence. Proud and strongly nationalistic, the Thai people call their nation Muang Thai - "Land of the Free."

Founded in 1782 by King Rama I, Bangkok is home to more than eight million people. The capital's proper name is Krung Thep - the "City of Angels."

Grand Palace, Wat Trimitr, Wat Pra Keo & Cruise





Board your motorcoach at the pier and enjoy a scenic drive to Bangkok. Travel through the tropical countryside, passing tapioca fields, and rural towns and villages. Once you arrive in Bangkok, your tour takes you to the magnificent Temple of the Golden Buddha.

Wat Trimitr, the Temple of the Golden Buddha, houses one of the world's largest statues of the Buddha, carved from solid gold in the Sukothai style. In the 18th century, the Buddha was covered in plaster to protect it from invading armies. It was then "rediscovered" in 1957 when the statue was being moved by a crane. The plaster-covered Buddha slipped and landed in the mud, only to be found by a workman. Through a small crack in the plaster, he saw a sliver of gold and the magnificent work of art was revealed.

Continue by a drive past Chinatown and the colorful flower market en route to the grounds of Bangkok's Grand Palace, where you will discover Wat Phra Kaeo, also known as the Royal Chapel of the Emerald Buddha. This is one of Buddhism's most magnificent monasteries and one of the most celebrated sites in all Thailand. At the heart of the monastery is a Buddha carved from a single piece of emerald-green jasper, perched atop a gilded pedestal. The Emerald Buddha wears a costume that is changed throughout the year to reflect the seasons. In the summer months it wears a crown and jewelry, in the winter it is wrapped in a gold shawl, and in the rainy months it can be seen in a headdress and gilt robe. The Thai king, in a ritual ceremony that ushers in the new season and celebrates good fortune, is given the honor of changing the Buddha's costumes.

A walking tour of the Grand Palace takes you through its ornate and elaborate courtyards. The city's most spectacular landmark, the palace complex, once the residence of the Kings of Thailand, is now reserved for royal ceremonies and state occasions. Beautifully situated on the banks of the Chao Phraya River, the palace's major buildings, although designed in the European style, are crowned with glittering spires richly decorated with gilt and colored-glass mosaics.

After your palace tour, walk a short distance to the Chao Phraya River to board your riverboat for a scenic cruise.

Bangkok has long been hailed as the "Venice of the East." You'll float down the canals of the city's Thonburi district and possibly cruise past Wat Arun, known as the Temple of the Dawn, which once served as the Royal Chapel. The riverboat could also take in Phra Prang, a 260-foot high pagoda decorated with ceramic tiles and fragments of multi-colored porcelain. Numerous photo opportunities abound.

Once docked, a short walk brings you to a local restaurant where you are treated to a buffet lunch of international dishes and Thai favorites.

Refreshed, enjoy free time to shop for souvenirs at a nearby reputable shop.

Your full-day tour begins as you board your motorcoach for a scenic, two-hour drive to Bangkok, considered the "Venice of the East." En route, you'll travel through tropical countryside offering picturesque views of tapioca fields and small rural towns. Keep your camera ready for a myriad of photo opportunities.

Your first destination is the awe-inspiring Wat Po, one of the largest and oldest wats (temples) in Bangkok. Founded in the 17th century, Wat Po is home to more than one thousand Buddha images, as well as the Reclining Buddha, one of the largest single Buddha images. In 1832, King Rama III enlarged the temple and turned it into a center of learning, making it Thailand's first university. The temple is also considered the pre-eminent place of learning for the ancient Thai medicinal art of massage.

You're free to browse for souvenirs in the small local gift shop inside the temple before boarding your motorcoach for a short drive to a local restaurant. After savoring a delicious international buffet, you'll make your way to Wat Suthat, known for its Phra Sri Sakyamuni Buddha statue, an impressive bronze Buddha image that stands over 25 feet tall, and its magnificent doors and giant swing. You're sure to marvel at the huge red teak arch, the remains of an original swing, once the center of an annual ceremony where young men would try to swing high enough to retrieve a sack of gold tied to a pole in the air. So many men died in the attempt that the ceremony was banned in the 1930s.

Inside, the cloisters are lined with 156 gilded Buddha statues, six feet in height. Twenty-eight Chinese pagodas, representing the 28 previous lives of Buddha, envelope the monastery where the main Buddha statue is installed. Paintings cover an area of 27,450 sq. ft., and are perhaps the most extensive and important of their kind in Thailand. Take note of the doors to the cloister. Each is painted and gilded with colorful scenes from the Ramakien, Thailand's national epic, derived from the ancient Sanskrit epic, Ramayana.

Next, you'll take a ride on a tuk tuk, a motorized rickshaw named for the sound of its engine. You'll travel around the inner part of Bangkok and stop at the Jessadabordin Ground. Here, you'll witness a stunning Thai architectural-styled, open pavilion, and catch a glimpse of the Golden Stupa Mountain Temple, the highest temple in Bangkok, famed for its central golden mound-like structure. You'll also see Radchanadda Temple, best known for the Loha Prasat, a multi-tiered structure 118 feet high with 37 metal spires, signifying the 37 virtues toward enlightenment. Also within sight is the Makahan Fort, just one of the two remaining fortresses of medieval Bangkok.

Before calling it a day, you'll visit a reputable shopping venue and have ample time to browse for handicrafts, jewelry, souvenirs and gifts. You'll board your motorcoach and enjoy a relaxing two-hour drive back to the pier.



Opened in 1887, the then little bungalow was named after Sir Stamford Raffles, the founder of modern Singapore. Merchants offer fresh fruits and vegetables, perfect for an afternoon pick-me-up, and everything from saris and jewelry to intricate ornaments. One of the most popular souvenirs to bring home is a brass oil lamp. Rub it and make a wishhopefully returning to Singapore again.

After an exhilarating day, your motorcoach will serve as transportation to the airport.

Safety: Your safety and security are of the utmost importance to us and they are the primary consideration in the development and operation of our tour programs.

Value: We endeavor to select local tour operators who provide excursions of the highest quality and we carefully monitor prices to ensure that you are receiving good value. Remember to book early to receive the best possible price.

Q. WHAT DOES PRINCESS DO TO ENSURE MY SAFETY WHILE I'M ASHORE?

A. Our primary concern at Princess is your safety and security. We are in continual contact with authorities concerning any travel advisories that might impact our cruises. If the U.S. State Department advises against travel to specific locations we visit, we would make the necessary changes to the published itinerary. Although such itinerary changes occur infrequently, please understand that these changes are for your own safety and security and are beyond our control.

Despite all of our efforts and in light of recent world events, we remind all of our passengers that they must ultimately assume responsibility for their actions while ashore. In this regard, we would like to remind you of some common sense precautions when visiting ports-of-call:

- Stay in the normal tourist areas and don't travel to out-of the way places without the benefit of a guided tour offered through Princess.
- Do not leave any of your belongings unattended in public areas.
- Be generally aware of people and activities around you.
- Do not accept packages from anyone you don't know personally.
- Keep a low profile dress and behave conservatively.
- Be careful when eating and drinking ashore.

We thank you in advance for following these recommendations, which we believe will enhance the enjoyment of your cruise or cruisetour.

Q. WILL I MISS THE SHIP IF I GO ON A SHORE EXCURSION?

A. One very important feature of taking a shore excursion organized by Princess is that we closely monitor the departures and returns of all our tours. Therefore, our ships do not sail until all of our organized tour transportation has returned, so you can be assured that you won't miss the ship. Please keep in mind that when you make your own arrangements in port, or if you leave an organized tour, we will no longer be aware of your whereabouts; so be sure to schedule ample time to return to the ship before it sails.

Q. HOW DO I RESERVE MY SHORE EXCURSIONS IN ADVANCE OF MY CRUISE?

A. Visit our website at princess.com for the most up-to date shore excursion information, full tour descriptions and to request your shore excursions up until 5 days prior to your cruise. The Cruise Personalizer is the fastest and most convenient way to reserve your shore excursions. Please keep in mind that you will receive your tickets when you arrive onboard and all of your shore excursion purchases are charged to your shipboard account. Advance payment is not accepted. Since shore excursions have limited capacity, we encourage you to reserve your tours as early as possible to avoid disappointment and confirm the best price. Reservations are processed on a first-come, first-served basis.

You may change shore excursion requests, but be advised that shore excursion prices may change. Requests to add tickets at a later time can be made but these tickets may be at a higher price than those previously booked. If you request a shore excursion which you previously cancelled, these requests will be confirmed at the current shore excursion price, which may be higher.

Q. HOW DO I RESERVE MY LAND EXCURSIONS IN ADVANCE OF MY CRUISETOUR?

A. When you are ready to pre-reserve your land excursions, go to the Cruise Personalizer and have your booking number and credit card information ready to enter. A credit card must be registered for each passenger that wishes to participate on a land excursion and we accept Princess Visa, Visa, MasterCard, American Express, Discover and Diner's Club. Credit cards used to pre-reserve land excursions must be valid through the full length of your cruisetour and may also be used to establish your shipboard account. Although a credit card is required to reserve your excursion(s), quests are able to pre-reserve all of their land excursions with no deposit required. An auto-charge of all pre-reserved excursions will take place two days prior to your first Land Excursion booking. Confirmed pre-reserved excursions can be viewed at any time in your detailed itinerary in the Cruise Personalizer. The Cruise Personalizer will remain open until your cruisetour departure date so you may add or cancel tours prior to the cancellation deadline without penalty. Excursions cancelled once the auto-charge has been processed are subject to a 100% penalty. Note that excursion availability is based on cruisetour date, capacity limitations, and suitable weather conditions. Excursions are subject to change at any time and available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Guests are encouraged to book early as space is limited and flightseeing tours in particular may not be available for pre-reserving right up to tour departure date. Prior to travel, print your Travel Summary which will have a listing of all of your pre-reserved land excursions. You will also receive information on confirmed excursions in your Welcome Envelope upon arrival at each location.

Q. HOW CAN I BE SURE I AM CONFIRMED ON THE EXCURSIONS I WANT?

A. When you book your excursions online at princess.com, you receive an immediate confirmation of the status and price of your requested excursion. The site shows the remaining capacity on all tours, so you know if you are confirmed or waitlisted. To avoid disappointment and confirm the best price, please reserve your excursions as early as possible. If the specific tour time you requested is fully booked, Princess may schedule you on an alternate departure that corresponds with your other tour selections.

If your shore excursion choice is not available, we will put you on a waitlist and attempt to obtain more space on the shore excursion. If you have companions traveling with you in your stateroom or in other staterooms and would like everyone to be on the same shore excursion departure, order all the excursions under one name. Requests made individually, even if at the same time, may cause you to be booked on a different departure than your companions or waitlisted on an excursion for which your companions are confirmed.

Land Excursions can not be waitlisted but we actively request more space wherever possible from our tour operators; if a tour is sold out we encourage guests to revisit the Cruise Personalizer at a later date and they can also check for more availability at the tour desks in our Alaska ports.

Q. MAY I TAKE MORE THAN ONE TOUR IN A SINGLE PORT OF CALL?

A. Yes. In Alaska, Canada/New England, the Caribbean, Panama Canal, Hawaii and Mexico, allow at least 30 minutes between each tour. In all other regions, allow at least 60 minutes between each tour. All tours depart from, and return to, the cruise ship pier. By scheduling the appropriate amount of time between tours, you will have sufficient time to take multiple excursions.

Q. CAN I CANCEL AN SHORE EXCURSION I'VE REQUESTED?

A. Due to the limited capacity and high demand for helicopter flights and private vehicle options, these shore excursions are not refundable unless cancelled by 12:00pm on the day after embarkation.

For all other shore excursions, a "Closing Time for Bookings" for each port of call is listed on the Tour Order Form you will receive onboard in your stateroom. This is the time when the bookings for the tours in that port close and we notify the local operators of the final shore excursion requirements. You may cancel an excursion if it is prior to the closing time whether you reserved in advance or onboard. We cannot cancel a shore excursion if it is past this closing time, nor can we refund shore excursions on which you choose not to go. All shore excursions operate rain or shine unless cancelled by the tour operator.

Q. CAN I CANCEL A LAND EXCURSION I'VE REQUESTED?

A. Due to the exclusive nature and advanced planning required for excursions involving hotel accommodations, airline flights and some flightseeing tours, these excursions are not refundable within 30 days of sailing. A fee will be assessed onboard for any of these tours cancelled within 30 days of sailing.

Land Excursions, pre-reserved through the Cruise Personalizer, may be cancelled up to the Land Excursion cancellation deadline which is two days prior to your first land excursion booking. At the cancellation deadline, all pre-reserved land excursions will be auto-charged using the credit card that you provided in the Cruise Personalizer to reserve your tours. Excursions cancelled once the auto-charge has been processed are subject to a 100% penalty, unless the operator, at their sole discretion, is unable to operate the program due to unforeseen circumstances. All sales of tours booked while on your land tour are considered final at the time of purchase and are 100% non-refundable except in the case of an operator approved cancellation.

Q. CAN I REQUEST TO BE REFUNDED FOR MY LAND EXCURSION.

A. In the event of any excursion being cancelled for reasons beyond our control, a full refund will be made. Land

Excursions that were pre-reserved, charged and then cancelled due to weather or other operator approved cancellation will be refunded using the same credit card used to book your excursions. These refunds will typically be reflected on your credit card statement between 7-10 business days after cancellation. Tours booked while on your land tour are considered final at the time of purchase and are 100% non-refundable except in the case of a cancellation by the vendor. Should any excursion have to be abandoned through force majeure or difficulties en route, the best possible refund will be arranged according to the circumstances.

Q. HOW DOES THE PRINCESS EXCURSIONS PROGRAM OPERATE ONBOARD?

A. Our Shore Excursion Manager runs the onboard portion of the Princess Shore Excursions program. Tour Office staff are available to answer questions and make shore excursion reservations for you. Once onboard in your stateroom, you will find tickets for the shore excursions you reserved in advance. If you have not yet reserved tours or would like to purchase additional shore excursions, you will find a Tour Order Form in your stateroom. You will also find a schedule of daily activities, the Princess Patter, which features important program information including Tour Office hours and the closing time for shore excursion bookings. Remember, tickets are sold on a first-come, first-served basis and space on shore excursions is limited, so book early. A Tour Order Form drop box is located near the Tour Office where you may deposit your order form at any time.

Q. ARE THERE CHILDREN'S PRICES AVAILABLE?

A. Yes, on some tours for children age 12 and under. If you are traveling with children, please pre-reserve the number of child tickets you would like on the Cruise Personalizer. If the adult and child price is the same, please order all tickets as adult. Once onboard the ship or at one of our land excursion destinations, check your tour tickets to ensure you have received the correct number of adult and child tickets. Visit the Tour Office as soon as possible to make any necessary adjustments. Parents are also responsible for bringing a safety seat for their child.

On most helicopter and flightseeing tours, children 24 months of age and older are required to have their own seat. Children under 24 months are considered lap infants and may ride free of charge if the tour operator can accommodate them - with prior arrangement through the onboard Tour Office. Parents must show proof of age to the tour operator for any lap infant. Children under the age of 24 months are not able to participate on a helicopter tour.

Q. ARE PRIVATE SHORE EXCURSION OPTIONS AVAILABLE WHERE I CAN CUSTOMIZE MY TOUR?

A. Yes, in many ports we offer shore excursions that can be customized to your specifications. On these tours you are able to book exclusive use of the tour vehicle (automobile, boat or plane) and tailor the tour to include activities and venues you want to experience.

Due to the limited capacity and highly specialized nature of these excursions, they are not refundable unless cancelled by 12:00pm on the day after embarkation or prior to the booking closing time for the port which is listed on the onboard Tour Order Form (whichever is first). Once onboard the ship, you may be provided with a preference card to advise the tour operator of your selected itinerary and interests. The onboard Tour Staff will gladly assist you and provide recommendations.

Please note these shore excursions are sold per transport, not per person, so only one passenger should make the reservation for the entire group. This is a private arrangement and those accompanying you are the guests you choose; Princess does not match up individual passengers to form a private group for the vehicle. The price listed includes the means of transport and/or private guide and does not include gratuities, meals and attraction entrance fees (unless indicated otherwise) as these will vary based on your choices.

Q. ARE THERE AGE OR OTHER RESTRICTIONS ON TOURS?

A. For most tours, there is no minimum age for children as long as they are accompanied by a parent or guardian. Passengers under the age of 18 years cannot participate without a parent or guardian. Please review the tour description notes for the most current restrictions and any exceptions; a few operators may allow an unaccompanied minor on tour if a wavier is signed by the parent or guardian in the operator's presence. Any other restrictions imposed by the tour operator are listed in the "Special Notes" section of each tour description.

Q. IS A VISA REQUIRED FOR ANY OF THE PORTS I VISIT?

A. Please review the information detailed in the "Itinerary" section of the Cruise Personalizer regarding any applicable visas for your specific voyage.

Q. IS ANY ADDITIONAL DOCUMENTATION REQUIRED TO PARTICIPATE ON SHORE EXCURSIONS?

A. Passports, visas and other documentation may be required on certain shore excursions. Please review the "Special Notes" section of the shore excursion for full details. Notarized written consent is required for children crossing international borders without both parents.

Q. ARE THE EXCURSIONS GUIDED?

A. Yes. All of our excursions include local English-speaking guides except for On Your Own tours and where otherwise noted.

Q. SHOULD I TIP THE TOUR GUIDE?

A. Tipping is a discretionary matter; however, it is customary, if one is pleased with their tour, to tip the tour guide. A

general rule of thumb is \$2 per person for a half-day tour and \$5 per person for a full-day tour.

Q. WHAT TYPE OF CLOTHING SHOULD I WEAR WHILE ON TOUR OR IN PORT?

A. During your cruise, the climate can range from temperate and cool to hot and humid. Please plan to dress in layered, light- to medium-weight clothing and comfortable, low-heeled walking shoes. Since weather conditions may vary, we suggest you also pack a sweater, a light jacket and an all-weather coat. In addition, don't forget a hat or visor, a collapsible umbrella, sunglasses, sun screen and of course your camera and extra film and batteries. Please note that for water-related excursions where we suggest you wear your bathing suit, cover-up and hat, we have placed a symbol next to the shore excursion description.

If you plan to participate on an overland tour and will need to recharge video equipment or use a hair dryer, we suggest you bring an international adapter. Whenever you plan on going ashore, we highly encourage you to leave your valuables and jewelry onboard. While ashore, please take care in protecting your purses, cameras and other personal items. Minimizing personal belongings brought ashore could expedite the security process when reboarding the ship. We suggest you carry a photocopy of your passport when going ashore as you may need your passport number to exchange currency.

Please be mindful that in some of the countries you will visit, the local people may have somewhat more conservative views concerning dress than those to which you are accustomed. Generally shorts, tank tops, and short skirts are not acceptable dress when visiting churches or places of worship. Specific information regarding appropriate dress in these ports is provided with the shore excursion. For all golf tours, collared shirts and either long pants or Bermudastyle shorts are required (no cut-offs, bathing suits, etc.).

Q. WILL I MISS MEALS IF I GO ON SHORE EXCURSIONS?

A. Our wide variety of dining venues, including a 24-hour buffet, means there are always meal options available onboard that fit within the shore excursion timing you select.

Q. IS THERE TIME FOR SHOPPING ON THE EXCURSIONS?

A. Shopping is, for many, an important part of travel and, wherever possible, time for this activity is allowed within the framework of many of our shore excursions. Please note, however, that the actual amount of time available for shopping is generally limited.

Q. DO THE EXCURSIONS INCLUDE MUCH WALKING AND STAIR CLIMBING?

A. All of our excursions involve some walking and some excursions include more walking and stair climbing than others. Walking may be over uneven surfaces such as cobblestone city streets or the rocky pathways of ancient ruins. On many excursions, it is necessary to negotiate stairs. Please keep in mind that many of the buildings you will be visiting may have been constructed well before conveniences such as elevators were invented and have been preserved in their original state. Please refer to our tour symbols with each excursion description for more information and guidance.

Q. WHAT ELSE SHOULD I ANTICIPATE IN PORTS?

A. Keep in mind that some sites you will be visiting are extremely popular among both tourists and locals. Therefore, you may encounter crowded conditions, whether participating in one of our tours or sightseeing on your own. Regrettably, we have no control over this situation. With regard to photography, some venues may prohibit the use of flash cameras, so fast-speed film is recommended. In some places, photography or video may be prohibited altogether or a fee may be imposed. We ask that you observe any restrictions and, if in doubt, ask your guide for assistance.

Q. AM I REQUIRED TO WEAR SAFETY EQUIPMENT ON TOUR?

A. Yes, on certain tours it is mandatory that you wear the appropriate safety equipment in order to participate. Such equipment includes, but is not limited to snorkel vests, life vests, helmets, etc.

Q. WHAT IS REQUIRED TO PARTICIPATE IN A CERTIFIED DIVE TOUR?

A. An open-water scuba certification card must be presented in order to participate in a certified dive tour. Unfortunately, we are unable to accommodate divers with either a Junior Open Water or a Scuba Diver rating due to the depth limitations imposed by these certifications. The sport-diving industry recommends that divers take an update course if they have not been diving within the last six months. Please note that some dive operators may reserve the right to refuse to take divers who cannot provide proof of the date of their last dive or scuba review course. We recommend you bring a log book or proof that you have recently completed a review course.

There are certain medical conditions that may prevent your participation. Accordingly, you will be required to complete a medical-history form and liability waiver/release form that will be supplied onboard or by the tour operator. Following is a non-inclusive list of several medical conditions that may prevent you from safely participating in scuba diving. Any of these conditions would also require an examination prior to your cruise by a qualified physician to obtain written permission to participate in scuba diving activities. Heart disease or previous heart attack, diabetes, epilepsy or seizures, high blood pressure or the need to take medication to control blood pressure, pregnancy, asthma or any form of lung disease, recent surgery, blackouts, sinus problems, fear of closed spaces, recurring complicated migraines headaches, recurrent ear problems, severe motion sickness and presently taking prescription

medicines with the exception of birth control. Passengers are welcome to bring and use their own personal equipment, but is must be stored in their stateroom and there is no reduction in the tour price.

Q. ARE THERE ANY SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR PARTICIPATING IN AN INTRODUCTORY/DISCOVER SCUBA DIVING TOUR?

A. Yes, there are certain medical conditions that may prevent your participation. Accordingly, you must complete a medical history form and liability waiver/release form that will be provided on board or by the tour operator at the beginning of the tour. Following is a non-inclusive list of several medical conditions that may prevent you from safely participating in scuba diving. Any of these conditions would also require an examination prior to your cruise by a qualified physician to obtain written permission to participate in scuba diving activities. Heart disease or previous heart attack, diabetes, epilepsy or seizures, high blood pressure or take medicine to control blood pressure, presently taking prescription medicines with the exception of birth control, pregnancy, asthma or any form of lung disease, recent surgery, blackouts, sinus problems, fear of closed spaces, recurring complicated migraine headaches, recurrent ear problems, and severe motion sickness. For Introductory Scuba Diving tours there is a minimum age of 10. Passengers under the age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

Q. ARE THERE ANY SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR PARTICIPATING IN A SNUBA DIVING, HELMET DIVING OR UNDERWATER SCOOTER TOUR?

A. Yes, there are certain medical conditions that may prevent your participation. Accordingly, you will be required to complete a medical-history form and liability waiver/release form that will be supplied onboard or by the tour operator. Following is a non-inclusive list of several medical conditions that may prevent you from safely participating in scuba diving. Any of these conditions would also require an examination prior to your cruise by a qualified physician to obtain written permission to participate in scuba diving activities. Heart disease or previous heart attack, diabetes, epilepsy or seizures, high blood pressure or take medicine to control blood pressure, presently taking prescription medicines with the exception of birth control, pregnancy, asthma or any form of lung disease, recent surgery, blackouts, sinus problems, fear of closed spaces, recurring complicated migraine headaches, recurrent ear problems, and severe motion sickness. For helmet or SNUBA tours there is a minimum age of 8 years and passengers must weigh at least 75 pounds. For underwater scooter tours there is a minimum age of 10.

Q. ON SPORTFISHING EXCURSIONS, DO I GET TO KEEP THE FISH I CATCH?

A. Most sportfishing tours offered by Princess are part of a catch-and-release program. Fish that are edible and not endangered are typically landed and kept by the boat crew. Please remember you have purchased an opportunity to catch fish, not a guarantee of doing so. As one of our boat captains said, "We guarantee fishing, not catching."

In Alaska only, if your tour is not designated as catch and release, your catch can be processed and shipped home for an additional charge as arranged by the tour operator. Because of its perishable nature and U.S. Customs regulations, your catch may not be sent outside of the United States in most cases. Due to federal regulations, your catch may not be stored onboard the ship, but may be prepared for dinner onboard. Fish caught while at our lodges in Alaska, needs to be shipped home if not part of a catch-and-release program. In Alaska, fishing licenses are required and can be purchased on your boat for \$20 per person in cash (rates subject to change). Fishing for king salmon requires an additional \$10 retention tag (rates subject to change). Children under 16 do not need a license. Fish runs are dependent on spawning seasons, so during May and late-September fish stock may be more limited. Go to www.adfg.state.ak.us for more details on licensing requirements and fishing regulations in Alaska.

Q. WHAT SHOULD I KNOW BEFORE TAKING A HELICOPTER TOUR?

A. Due to weight and balance limitations, as well as passenger safety and comfort, the helicopter excursion companies have advised that passengers weighing 250 pounds or more (fully clothed) will be assessed a surcharge to reserve adequate space onboard the helicopter. The surcharge amount will be indicated in the "Special Notes" section of each tour.

Because of the limited capacity and high demand for helicopter tours, they are not refundable unless cancelled by 12:00pm on the day after embarkation. Children 24 months of age and older are required to have their own seat. Children under 24 months are considered lap infants and may ride free of charge if the tour operator can accommodate them - with prior arrangement through the onboard Tour Office. Parents must show proof of age to the tour operator for any lap infant.

Carry-on bags are not allowed and limited secure storage is provided at the heliport. Helicopters may carry up to six guests depending on combined group weight. The flight length is approximate and flight route may vary due to weather conditions. Helicopter tours may be cancelled on short notice due to weather or safety issues. Warm clothing and sunglasses are recommended on helicopter tours. Dressing in layers is practical and lets you adjust your attire to meet changing conditions.

For helicopter tours in Denali National Park, a surcharge is not charged for guest over 250lbs. The helicopter company will assign aircraft and seats based on weight and balance. While every consideration is made to keep traveling companions and/or families together, this is not always possible for safety reasons.

Q. DOES PRINCESS OWN THE TOUR COMPANIES IN THE PORTS?

A. No, all of the shore excursions are operated by local, independent companies not by Princess; Princess retains a

portion of the total sale. We selected only the most reputable companies available to provide your excursions. The companies providing your excursions are selected by Princess based on their excellent reputation for service and safety.

Q. WHAT DO YOU RECOMMEND FOR PHYSICALLY CHALLENGED PASSENGERS?

A. Our answer, of course, depends on the type and degree of the disability. The goal of Princess Cruises is to provide a safe comfortable cruise experience for all passengers. If you will be using a mobility device during your sailing we strongly recommend you travel with a person physically fit to assist with your needs both onboard and ashore.

If passengers are able to walk on their own, we recommend tours designated as requiring a moderate level of activity. The transport on some tours may be able to accommodate a collapsible wheelchair stored below the bus; scooters or motorized wheelchairs are often too large. If confined to a wheelchair, we would recommend reserving the excursions identified as wheelchair accessible (see Tour Symbols listed for each tour) or a private vehicle shore excursion. We also recommend that non-ambulatory passengers be accompanied by someone who is able to assist them throughout the duration of their day. Our Tour Staff can provide more information on touring options for non-ambulatory guests. Physically challenged passengers participating on a shore excursion must contact the Tour Office at least 48 hours prior to your excursion to ensure arrangements can be made to meet your particular needs.

Embarking and disembarking can be challenging for those with limited mobility. Many major ports of call provide easy access for wheelchairs and scooters. However due to various conditions: steepness of the gangway, weather, shoreside facilities and tidal and sea conditions, passengers using mobility devices may be required to transfer to a stair climber or be precluded from going ashore. Princess staff will make every effort to assist but are not allowed to individually physically lift more than 50 pounds (22 kg).

Some ports of call require the ship to anchor off shore. Passengers are then taken to shore by small boats or tenders. When tendering is required, passengers using mobility devices will not be transferred into or out of the tender, if lifting in excess of the above limitation is required. Many tender ports do not provide wheelchair access so even if the passenger can board the tender they may not be able to disembark ashore. Again the shoreside facilities, movement of the tender, weather and tidal conditions can also preclude tendering.

The decision to allow any passenger to board a tender or disembark the vessel will be made by the Captain on the basis of the safety and welfare of all involved and is final. If passengers are unable to tender or disembark because of circumstances outlined above there will be no refund or credit for missed ports. While Princess recognizes your disappointment the safety of both passengers and crew takes precedence.

For more information on the terms and conditions for Princess Shore Excursions, please refer to the Special Information section. Every effort will be made to accommodate all passengers on the tour of their choice but, tours are operated by independent local companies and not by Princess. The final determination to let any passenger participate is made by the tour operator and therefore if, in the judgment of the tour operator, the safety or comfort of any passenger is in question, guests may be denied participation. This evaluation may not be able to be determined until meeting directly with the local tour operator.

Special Information

CONDITIONS In selling tickets (including coupons or vouchers) or otherwise promoting or making arrangements for Excursions— whether for air, land or local water transportation; tours; sports or any other recreational activities; shore accommodations or meals or for any service, facility or activity other than onboard Princess' cruise ships — Princess acts only as agent for the independent tour operator supplying such excursions or services. Participation by a passenger in Excursions is conditioned upon such passenger's acceptance of the terms and conditions set forth in the Passage Contract contained in the Cruise Ticket, the Excursion Ticket and, depending on the activity, other documents which, among other things, expressly release Princess from any liability for such participation. Participation may also be subject to the independent tour operators' own terms and conditions.

EXCURSION TIMINGS Departure times for each tour will be listed on princess.com in the Cruise Personalizer. For Shore Excursions, they will also be listed on the Tour Order Form, which you will receive onboard. These have been published according to information from our Tour Operators, but are subject to change should the vessel's arrival time at any port be delayed, or the itinerary for any particular excursion be amended. Please note that the time shown will be the time the last tour vehicle leaves the pier or hotel. Passengers are requested to report to the specified departure location (either onboard ship or shoreside) at the designated time, as delay on your part can interfere with the pleasure of your fellow passengers.

EXCURSIONS WITH LIMITED PARTICIPATION Shore Excursions may be purchased in advance of your cruise departure or onboard ship on a first-come, first served basis. Many of our excursions have limited participation and reservation requests will be processed in the order received. When excursions are fully subscribed, additional requests will be placed on a waiting list in the order received. Land Excursions can not be waitlisted but we actively request more space wherever possible from our tour operators; if a tour is sold out we encourage guests to revisit the Cruise Personalizer at a later date and they can also check for more availability at the tour desks in our Alaska ports.

PERSONAL POSSESSIONS Coats, wraps, umbrellas, cameras, handbags, traveling bags and similar personal articles remain at all times through the tour under the passenger's custody and control. Be careful that you do not leave your possessions unattended at any time in the car or coach in which you are traveling.

PRICES The prices for Excursions are subject to change without notice; are per adult, per child or in some cases per vehicle. Prices are confirmed at the time of booking. All quotations made include conveyance according to the itinerary and, where applicable, meals, refreshments, guides and entrance fees, unless otherwise stated. Children, other than infants in arms, will be charged full fare unless noted otherwise.

SHOPPING Where possible, time for shopping has been allowed within the framework of some excursions. However, excursions are not primarily designed for shopping, and time allowed for this purpose may be limited.

REFUNDS No refunds can be made on any ticket, coupon or voucher unless notice of cancellation is given before the closing date indicated on the booking form for the excursions involved. The times when bookings will close will be published onboard. In the event of any excursion being canceled for reasons beyond our control, a full refund will be made. However, should any excursion have to be abandoned through force majeure or difficulties en route, the best possible refund will be arranged according to the circumstances. Land Excursions that were pre-reserved, charged and then cancelled due to weather or other operator approved cancellation will be refunded using the same credit card used to book your excursions. These refunds will typically be reflected on your credit card statement between 7-10 business days after cancellation. Tours booked while on your land tour are considered final at the time of purchase and are 100% non-refundable except in the case of a cancellation by the vendor.

TRANSPORTATION Passengers should appreciate that standards of transport vary considerably throughout the world. Air-conditioned coaches are not available in many areas, and in some, local buses are the best available. Cars or taxis are also used at some ports where coach or bus transportation is not available or limited. Passengers wishing to travel with friends should all leave the ship together, as this will help the Tour Staff to allocate them space in the same vehicle. For the comfort of all passengers, smoking is prohibited aboard all sightseeing vehicles.

WITHDRAWAL OF TOURS The Tour Operator reserves the right to withdraw any excursion through lack of demand and to make any alterations that they may deem advisable for the comfort of the passengers, bearing in mind the convenience and best interest of each group.

ECOLOGY & ENVIRONMENT. It is our policy to maintain a positive and proactive position in relation to the environment. We realize that there is much work to be done to achieve our company goals. To this end we are continually striving to increase awareness of any environmental issues that are likely to affect any of the excursions we offer. We work closely with our local agents to convey any environmental messages in our shore excursion programs and therefore ask you to support us in our efforts by respecting the cultures, customs and environmental issues of the various destinations we visit.
